Course description:

MAR580 is a course designed for the further study of cinematography in composition, lens choice, continuity, camera movement/support, lighting for film and video, and grip in both studio and location situations.

Objectives:

The course is designed to prepare students interested in cinematography to shoot with both technical and artistic expertise. Through both in and out of class assignments, students will begin to learn various strategies to lighting and shooting in both studio and location environments with an emphasis on shooting technically clean footage in analog film and digital formats. The course introduces the fields of Assistant Camera, Gaffer and Operator in detail with an emphasis on the low budget independent production as well as a basic introduction to color theory, and composition.
