(Field Course in European Cultural and Intellectual History)

**Format**

This course is divided between theoretical works and actual models of cultural and intellectual history, but the dividing line between the two categories is not always clear. We begin with some traditional approaches to the subject, move on to Marxist challenges to the tradition, and conclude with a brief survey of postmodernism and its implications for the field of cultural and intellectual history.

Each student will be responsible on a rotation basis for leading a portion of the weekly discussion. Students will write a weekly review of three-to-five pages for each reading, due the day of the discussion. I expect all papers to be handed in on time.

I have structured the course with the European Cultural and Intellectual History field course examination in mind. Students who only want a grade for this seminar and are not interested in field course credit will still have to write the reviews and take the field course examination, which will be given during finals week and then again as needed. All students who want field course credit should take the exam as soon as possible.
