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SCIENCE-TECHNOLOGY DIALOGUE WILL BE DISCUSSED  
AT UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA MONDAY

The disunity between scientific and technological activities will be discussed by Dr. Melvin Kranzberg, national lecturer for Sigma Xi, the science honorary, in an address Monday (May 1 ) at the University of Montana.

According to Dr. Kranzberg, researchers in many areas of science and technology have failed to establish a dialectic between their disciplines. He believes, however, a certain amount of disunity is necessary for advancement in both science and technology.

Dr. Kranzberg is a professor of history and head of the graduate program in history of science and technology at the Case Institute of Technology, Cleveland, Ohio.

He is a graduate of Amherst College and Harvard University where he received a Ph. D. in modern French history in 1942. Following three years in the Army Intelligence Corps during World War II, Dr. Kranzberg taught at Harvard, Stevens Institute of Technology and Amherst. He accepted his appointment to Case Institute in 1952.

Dr. Kranzberg's address, which is open to the public, will begin at 8 p.m. in the journalism auditorium.
