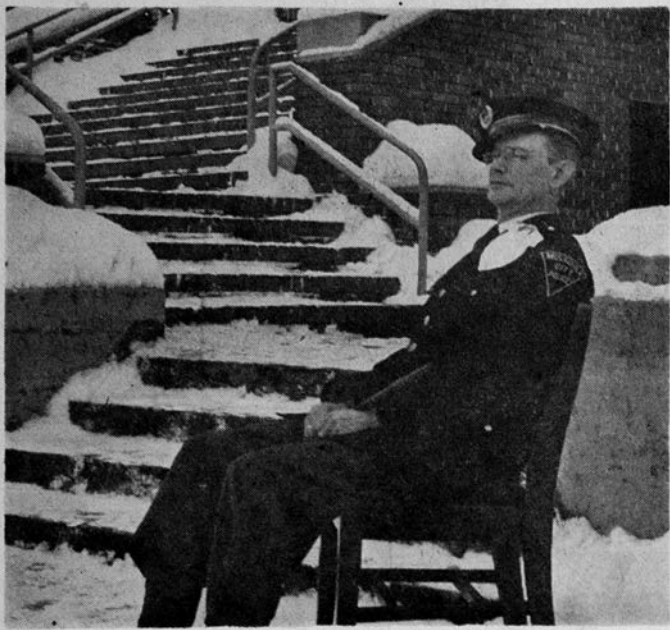

Fall Honor Roll Lists 268; Fourteen Get A-Flushes

Honor roll figures for autumn quarter released Thursday by the registrar list 268 University students.

Seniors dominated the total with 69 represented, but they were closely pressed by the juniors and sophomores with 61 and 57, respectively. Freshmen with 49 and graduate students with 32 completed the list.

These students had either a minimum of thirty-six grade points with an index of 2.0, or a minimum of thirty grade points with an index of 2.5.

'Macbeth' Casting Complete, Rehearsals in Full Swing

Casting for "Macbeth," to be presented Jan. 29 through Feb. 2, is finished and rehearsals are in full swing, director LeRoy Hinze announced today. Art Lundell, Milwaukee, Wis., is to play a double role. He will appear as Duncan, the Scottish king, and as a doctor.

Lundell is a junior journalism major who has had wide experience in MSU drama and was president of Masquers last year.

He has played in "Our Town," "There Shall Be No Night," "Antigone," "Liliom," "Joan of Lorraine," "Upstage," and "The Madwoman of Chaillot."

Otis Packwood, Billings, who will be Malcolm, one of Duncan's sons, is a transfer from Eastern Montana college where he acted in "The Importance of Being Earnest" and "Craig's Wife." He is a senior in the law school.

Leading Roles

Glenn Reznor, Marjorie Lovberg, Jack Shapira, and Dick Barsness are cast in the four leading roles, as previously announced. The title role of Macbeth will be played by Reznor, who is a teacher at Missoula County high school. Miss Lovberg, a freshman from

Missoula, will be Lady Macbeth, and Dick Barsness, Medicine Lake, will be Macduff and also a captain in the army. Jack Shapira, New York City, has three roles: Banquo, one of the leads; Siward, an English general; and a porter in Macbeth's service.

Ross, a powerful lord, will be portrayed by Tom Sherlock, Great Falls. He has played in "Antigone," "There Shall Be No Night," "Joan of Lorraine," and "The Doctor in Spite of Himself." Sherlock is a business administration major.

Rose As Angus

Allen Rose, a transfer student from Northern Montana college at Havre, will play Angus. At Havre he played the leading roles in "Our Town," "The Glass Menagerie," and "The Imaginary Invalid."

Dorothy Ross, Butte, will be Lady Macduff. Her previous roles have been in "Our Town," "The Doctor in Spite of Himself," "Joan of Lorraine," "Liliom," and "Antigone."

Other roles are Duncan's son Donalbain, James White, Billings; Banquo's son Fleance, Tom Kilpatrick, Laurel; and Siward's son, Dale Harvey, Kalispell.

Sally Stamm, Dillon, is Lady Macbeth's gentlewoman; John Pecarich, Missoula, plays a servant; and Dale Wing, Poplar, is an attendant.

The two murderers employed by Macbeth are Louie Elmore, Billings, and Carl Felsman who also plays a messenger.

Pat Koob, Bozeman, is Hecate and her three witches are Rita Bach, Sidney; Alice Ann Buls, Missoula; and Carol Murray, Kalispell.

Two Missoula high school boys also have parts in the play. Sandy Demmons is Macduff's son and Bob Peters is Seyton.

Cash for Scholars

The federal government, in true form, has issued another government bulletin. But this one may have considerable interest to those students who are seeking a fellowship or scholarship in their field.

This latest bulletin is a compilation of scholarships and fellowships available at institutions of higher education and the total list for subject-matter fields numbers over 25,000.

Fields reporting the largest number of scholarships were music, agriculture, engineering, education, home economics, theology, medicine, religious education, fine arts, and law.

Some of the scholarships have tricky tag-lines—that is, the applicant must qualify in some unusual respect. For instance, some scholarships specify that the recipient must be the descendant of a Confederate soldier; a former caddy, Scout, newsboy, or 4-H club member; a child of a member of the Flat Janitors' Union; a poor white girl; or an individual surnamed Stanley.

One scholarship was restricted to only those individuals with a reputation for truthfulness. Others asked that the recipient be the descendant of an Alaskan pioneer, be a needy farm boy or an orphan.

Grizzlies in First Home Conference Game Saturday

In the first Skyline conference basketball game in the university gym, the hustling Montana Grizzlies will tangle with the tall Wyoming Cowboys tomorrow night at 8 p.m.

Since returning from a three-game road trip last Tuesday, Grizzly hoop coach Jiggs Dahlberg has been putting his cagers through stiff workouts every afternoon. Yesterday Dahlberg had the squad practicing on offensive and defensive plays. This afternoon he will put his squad through a light scrimmage.

Davis, Sparks, Forwards

Dahlberg said he would start Chuck Davis, high scorer for the Grizzlies, and Bob Sparks at forwards. In the guard positions he will place Ed Anderson and Capt. Hal Sherbeck. To replace the injured Jack Luckman, he said he would start Dale Johnson at center.

On his second platoon team he said he was not sure whom he would use, but said the five freshmen he brought up from the freshman team earlier in the week would see some action.

Freshman Replacements

Dahlberg was hopeful that the freshman replacements, who are all over six feet, would counteract some of the height of the Cowboys. He said although he will start Johnson at center, Don Sanskus, six feet, four inches, would see lots of action, along with Dick Trinastich, Frank Nickel, George Samuelson, and Don Chaney.

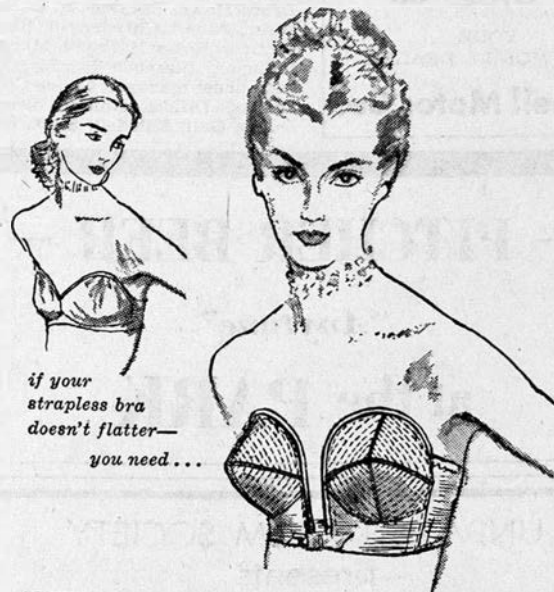

When the Grizzlies wrangle with the tall Wyoming Cowboys tomorrow night they will be sorely missing the services of Mick Luckman. His ball hustling on the backboards and great competitive spirit has been a definite spark in the Grizzly attack. When he left the game at Utah the Grizzlies were left without rebounds.

Coach Jiggs Dahlberg's two platoon system, for whatever advantages it may have, did not work on the Utah hardwoods. They were no match for the seasoned Utah Redskins. The Utah coach, Vandal Peterson leaves his starting five almost intact unless fouls claim them. Glenn Smith, Utah's All-American promotion, played the entire game so he could boost his point average to 20 points per game.

Smith is a hook shot artist comparable to former Grizzly ace Bob Cope. With either hand Smith splits the cords from anywhere around the keyhole. He is also terrific at faking out his guarding foe, thus giving him many setups. He faked one Grizzly so far that he missed a perfect setup while laughing. But he isn't the best player on the Utah team. Paul Shrum is the sparkplug of the team from his guard position. He makes his points the hard way, by driving to the basket or shooting long set shots.

Chuck Davis has shaken an early season slump to become the second highest scorer in the Skyline loop. Davis in three conference games has poured in 56 points for a 18.7 game average. He has taken 52 shots and dumped 21 of them through the cords for a .404 average. At the free throw line Davis, who was pathetic at free shots in the Idaho game here, has really improved. In conference games he has a .737 average, dropping 14 of 19 gift tosses. Smith leads conference scorers with 76 points in four games, a 19 point game average. Moe Radovich in two games has 35 points to place third with a 17.5 conference average.

The Grizzlies won't win tomorrow night. Wyoming's two-platoon Cowboys with their fast and control ball units, and superior height, will prove too much for the hustling Grizzlies. There is always the chance of upset, but without rebounds, how?
