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UM LAW SCHOOL RECEIVES \$2,000 GRANT

MISSOULA-- The University of Montana School of Law received a \$2,000 grant Wednesday (Sept. 13) from the S & H Foundation, sponsored by the Sperry and Hutchinson Co. The money will be used to support a series of four lectures and panel discussions which will explore the "Adaptation of Legal Forms to Meet the Needs of a Changing Society" during the 1967-68 academic year.

Robert S. Alexander of Spokane, Wash., and zone manager for the Sperry and Hutchinson Co., presented the check to Robert E. Sullivan, dean of the Law School. "With this beginning we hope the Law School can put on an annual series that will consider emerging problems in Montana and offer some possible solutions," Dean Sullivan said.

The first lecture will be given Nov. 16. Its topic will be "Constitutional Revision--The Organization and Implementation of a Plan for Constitutional Revision." The lecturer will be William Pierce, director of the Legislative Reference Bureau of the University of Michigan Law School and president of the National Conference on Commissioners on Uniform State Laws.

The second lecture will be presented Feb. 15. The lecturer has not been determined. The topic is "Interstate Compacts--A Solution to Original Interstate Needs"

The third lecture will be given March 8. Its topic is "The Ombudsman." The lecturer will be Prof. Stanley V. Anderson of the University of California, Santa Barbara.

The fourth lecture will be presented April 18. Its topic will be "The Consumer Credit Code." The lecturer will be George R. Richter, Jr. of Los Angeles, Calif. He is a member of the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws and the former president of the Conference.

To provide a frame of reference for each lecture, an afternoon panel discussion will precede each evening's talk. Panelists will review the broad subject to be presented that night, according to Dean Sullivan.
