Statement Shows Operating Surplus For Field House

When a financial statement was prepared on July 31, the University Field House had an operating surplus slightly less than \$2,000, ASMSU Business Manager Joan Bachman, Missoula, told Central board yesterday.

This was the first release of an economic nature concerning the self-liquidating venture of MSU into "big-time athletics."

In other business, Central board referred to Budget and Finance committee a recommendation to establish some type of identification card for graduate students to give them the same benefits as undergraduates.

\$1,967 Surplus

Miss Bachman, quoting figures released by Robert Breen, Field House manager, said the total income from dances, games, shows and other activities in the building was \$26,212. The total overhead was \$24,245. This left, according to the July 31 statement, an operating surplus of \$1,967.

Miss Bachman spelled out other details of the report and invited interested students to check it with her if they so desired.

Graduate Cards

Larry Gaughan showed Central board an "identification card" from the University of Colorado, similar to those he wants adopted here. He said graduate students who do not buy regular activity cards are required to pay standard admission prices.

"But," said Gaughan, "if they do buy activity cards, they don't get their money's worth. Most of the activities are designed for undergraduates; graduates are not interested in them."

Douglas Anderson Reports Sentinel Nearly Completed

1954 Sentinels will be here by Thanksgiving, says ASMSU President Don Chaney, Livingston. He received word from Editor Doug Anderson, who is working with the publisher in Billings, that much progress is being made and the book is nearing completion.

Anderson gave much credit to Pat Koob, Wolf Point, for her work with the book copy, and Chuck Jacoby, Missoula, for helping with the files, after several production setbacks caused a delay in delivery.

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A Test of the Honor System

Early Sunday morning a unique thing is taking place at MSU. It is a particularly novel occurrence for the women. AWS has granted 2:45 a.m. hours so that Grizzly fans can meet the team at the airport when they arrive from New Mexico.

It is not all so simple as it sounds, of course. AWS has put heavy restrictions on the whole thing to ensure the fact that MSU women do go to the rally as agreed and not just make a night of it.

Traditions Board Idea

The whole idea comes from Traditions board members who have worked on it in the hopes of strengthening school spirit and perhaps starting a new precedent at MSU. Chairman Johan Miller knows he holds a pretty hot potato because if the idea fails he will

have to face the wrath of AWS and the fact that such a thing would never be considered again.

Honor System Proponents

The little ASMSU committee that wholeheartedly believes in the honor system ideal knows that if the students understand the conditions of the rally, it will work, and will be proof of the workability of an honor code. But, if it doesn't, if women sign out and only traditions board is on hand to meet the plane, it will be quite apparent that Montana university people are not mature enough to be placed on their own—on their own honor.

Too Many Rules

The rules are too many but they should not hinder the cooperation this time. If just a little enthusiasm is exerted for the Grizzlies, if it is coupled with an acceptance of things as they stand, and if students prove they are not a tribe of savages just waiting for a chance to be let out, there will be a next time. A next time when everyone involved will be sure that things will run smoothly no matter what the restrictions, if any are needed at all.—P.O'H.

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MSU, New Mexico to Battle Without Stars Heath, White

"If the team plays the kind of game they are capable of, Montana has a good chance of defeating New Mexico," commented Coach Eddie Chinske on the eve of the Grizzlies' departure for Albuquerque.

The Grizzlies, minus the services of Dick Heath, Bill Gue, and Nels Olson, leave this morning by plane for their encounter with the Lobos, who will be entertaining the Grizzlies for Homecoming. Both teams boast 2-4 records.

Coach Chinske hasn't decided who he will run at quarterback, but indicated he may start sophomore Paul Enchson, with Imer and Campbell at halfbacks and Milne or Dantic at the fullback slot. If Chinske moves Campbell to the quarterback slot, Shupe will play halfback.

The Silvertip mentor believes

that New Mexico is as strong defensively as they were last year, but offensively they have been ineffective. As a team, the Lobos have gained just 125 more yards rushing than has Montana's Dick Imer.

The Lobos run from a straight T-formation, shifting occasionally to the spread or the single-wing formation. A unique feature of their single-wing attack is that the quarterback takes the ball from center in the same manner as he does from the T.

Montana faces a strong defensive team bolstered by all-conference ends Bobby Morgan and Ray Guerette, but the Lobos will be hampered by the absence of all-conference center Larry White. In the backfield, New Mexico has such standouts as Porky Leyva, Buddy Cook, Jerry Apodaca, and A. L. Terpening.
