CHILDREN'S CONCERT
BY UM SYMPHONETTE
IS SATURDAY

MISSOULA--

The University of Montana Symphonette will give the first of a series of children's concerts at 3 p.m. Saturday (Dec. 2) in the Music Recital Hall on the Missoula campus. There is no admission charge and grade school students and those younger are particularly urged to attend.

The 32-piece ensemble is under direction of Eugene Andrie, UM professor of music. The group is composed of students and faculty.

This will be the ninth concert the Symphonette has given in various Montana cities this fall.

During Saturday's program, Andrie will speak about "The Magic of Musical Sounds" and the orchestra will illustrate how music is put together. Included in the Symphonette program will be "Symphony Number Five" by Schubert and "Dance of the Clows" by Rimsky-Korsakow.
