## Lodge Rent, Coordinator Top Meeting

A tentative policy of rental rates for the Cascade and Yellowstone rooms in the Lodge was drawn up Thursday evening by Central board and university authorities. The meeting, lasting nearly three hours, was held in Pres. Carl McFarland's office.

The meeting, presided over by Dr. Herbert J. Wunderlich, Dean of Students, was called by the president for discussion of long-range operation plans for the Lodge.

Using a diagram which he had drawn on the blackboard, the president explained how the lounge desk could function better if it were placed closer to the stairs which lead down to the Grizzly Grill from the east end of the lounge.

At present a counter in front of the lounge serves as desk.

A suggestion of the president's may bring about the conversion of a recess to the west of the counter into a women's slumber room.

Dr. Lendal H. Kotschevar, director of food services and residence halls, explained the problems involved in renting the Cascade and Yellowstone rooms for large functions.

For group uses not involving money-making, the Cascade room will rent for \$50, plus special expenses; the Yellowstone room, for \$10 for large functions, otherwise, no charge; for conference rooms and the small dining room there is no charge.

The rentals for money-making purposes will be half the net proceeds plus a \$75 guarantee for the Cascade room and a \$50 guarantee for the Yellowstone room.

Service organizations such as ASMSU, Bear Paws, Student Union, Spur, Mortar Board, and APO would not be required to pay the guarantee.

The need for a full-time coordinator for the activities in the Lodge was brought up by President McFarland, who requested that the names of people who might fill the position be suggested.

Other activities, now in the old Student Union, possibly to be moved to the Lodge, are the sign shop and the dark room. It was thought that the lounge should also be provided with writing desks and materials.

## All-Pro Center-Linebacker Appointed Assistant Coach

Naumetz, All-American and All-Pro, Will Assist Former Teammate Williams as MSU's Center and Linebacker Coach.

Fred Naumetz, 33, a former All-American and All-Professional center, was named yesterday by head football coach Jerry Williams as assistant football coach at Montana State University.

Naumetz will resign from a Federal Bureau of Investigation job in Seattle. He has been an FBI agent since 1951. He will report to Missoula on April 11.

"We are extremely fortunate to get a man like Naumetz," said Williams. "He was the greatest center and linebacker I have ever seen, and I've seen all the best ones of the past six years."

"Fred will be a fine asset to

our staff because he knows football and he is a very personable gentleman."

Williams indicated that Naumetz will be a line assistant, saying, "He will concentrate his knowledge and attention on our center and line-backer duties."

Naumetz was an All-American center under Frank Leahy when Boston college was a pre-war power in the east. He played in three bowl games, the Cotton Bowl, the Sugar Bowl, and the Orange Bowl, from 1940 to 1943.

After two years in the Navy, Naumetz played for the Los Angeles Rams from 1946 to 1950.

Naumetz was chosen as an All-Pro center and linebacker during the 1948 and 1949 seasons. He and Williams were defensive teammates on the Rams in 1949 and 1950.

In a phone call to the Grizzly athletic department Monday, Naumetz said, "I am looking forward to joining Jerry and to working at the University of Montana. For myself, I am anxious to get back into athletics and am eagerly awaiting those spring drills."

While in Seattle, Naumetz worked with Henry Blastic, a former Grizzly athlete at Missoula in the mid '30's.

"Blastic has our entire family sold on Western Montana and the State University," Naumetz said. "We feel that we know the people there already because of the fine reports and descriptions he has given us."

Thus, speculation has ended on selection of one of three assistants for Williams. The Grizzly mentor said yesterday that he would select another assistant "within the next three days."

Williams added that a third assistant probably would not be picked until some time in the future.

## Faulkner Talks Here April 18

William Faulkner, world-renowned American author and winner of the Nobel prize for literature, will speak in the music auditorium April 18 at 8:15 p.m. The Mississippi author will remain here until noon of the following day and possibly will be available for student group interviews.

Faulkner appears under the sponsorship of the Liberal Arts club which has planned its lecture meeting for the next three weeks. Harold Tascher, sociology professor, speaks today on "Social Work in the Cold War Era" as part of a series concerning the cold war.

Leslie Fiedler will speak at the pre-Faulkner meeting April 12.

## Four Appointed Committee Heads For Interscholastic

Interscholastic committee appointed committee heads and tentatively scheduled activities for hundreds of high school students that will invade the campus for Interscholastic Week, May 13-14, at a meeting last Tuesday night.

"We are primarily concerned with extra-curricular activities for non-participants," said Jim Abbott, Kalispell, chairman of the student committee.

Abbott explained that the faculty committee, headed by C. F. Hertler, physical education professor, has already scheduled the regular events—track, golf and tennis, speech, debate, and drama. Programs have also been mailed to competing high schools.

Abbott listed Pris Herget, Peoria, Ill., and Kathy Booth, Helena, as heads of a registration committee. Bruce Crippen, Billings, will take care of housing and food, while Betty Millhouse, Kalispell, will be in charge of entertainment.

## Streets Drop Out of Sight But Nobody Pays the Bills

Perhaps the most vital problem at present for MSU students, particularly those who own and drive automobiles, is the street situation in and around the University. It is no secret to those who have experienced a back-breaking, teeth-shattering ride, that Maurice, Eddy, or Van Buren could stand improvement. The big secret would seem to be—whose responsibility is it to improve or maintain these streets?

T. G. Swearingen, University maintenance engineer, says it is the city's responsibility. He pointed out that the University paid for the original construction of the streets, and, according to him, all subsequent repairs and maintenance should be paid for by Missoula.

### Is It the University's . . .

Swearingen further asserted that when the city rebuilt Eddy avenue between Maurice and Van Buren last summer, the city officials in charge at that time promised to re-do Maurice this year.

Walton R. L. Taylor, Missoula's City Manager, had this to say concerning the street situation. "We will treat the streets adjoining University property as we would any other street in Missoula. If it is maintainable, we will maintain it—at the city taxpayers' expense."

"However," Taylor continued, "In my considered opinion, Maurice avenue is not maintainable—it has no crown, no base, no drainage, and it should be rebuilt completely. If it is redone, the University, as the abutting property owner, will have to pay its due assessment."

### . . . And Do We Wait 'til 1957?

President Carl McFarland says that it is doubtful that any money will be forthcoming in the near future for street repairs. McFarland said that it is the responsibility of the State Board of Education to initiate actions concerning road and street repairs for the University, and that the Board can do nothing unless money is appropriated by the state legislature.

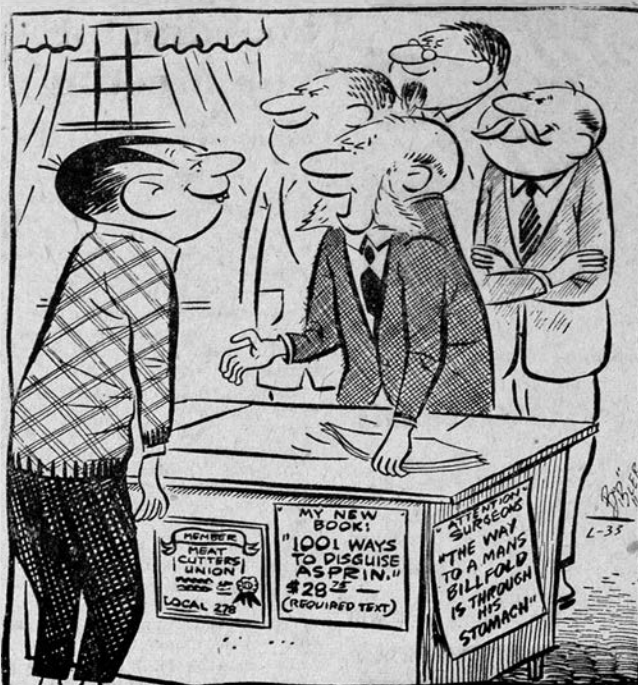
The State Legislature does not convene until 1957.

And to this Manager Taylor says, "If the University will not pay for the necessary street improvements, those streets can just lie there." He said that this held true for the city's proposed street improvement program for 1955 in which Eddy avenue and Van Buren street were earmarked for sealcoating and light construction.

It would seem therefore, that MSU's drivers should prepare themselves for at least another year of bone-shattering rides on streets that are adjoined by University property.

## Utah's Cold Snap May Curtail Gold, Tennis Play

Weather conditions in Utah will determine whether Grizzly tennis and golf teams leave tomorrow morning for matches with Utah, BYU, and Utah State, according to Athletic Director Jiggs Dahlberg.

Others vying for posts on the three-man team are Bob Riefflin, Dick Bork, and Jim Jackson.

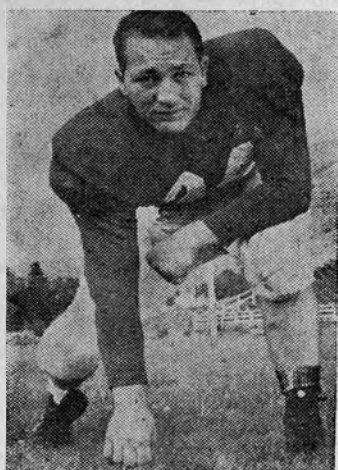
### AGGIE GAMES CANCELLED

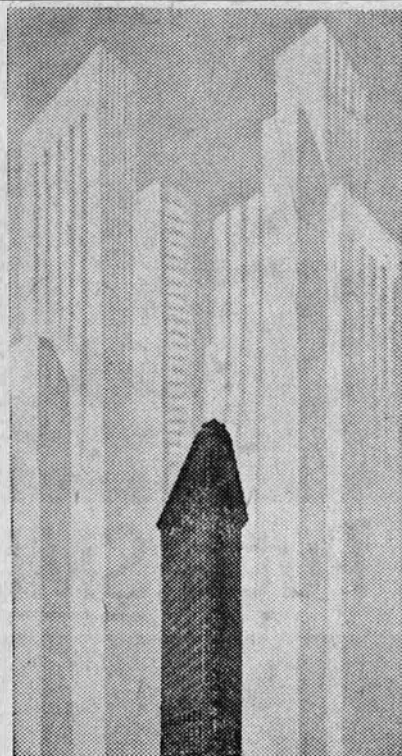

## Store Move Debated at Friday Forum

Three alternatives for the location of the student store were discussed at a meeting of the Montana Forum committee Friday noon in the Lodge. Guest speakers were John Earll, Great Falls, and Creta Stucky, Las Cruces, N.H., members of Store board.

The alternatives were: (1) to have the store remain where it is; (2) to move it to the Field House; (3) to move it into an eventual extension of the Lodge.

In considering the first alternative, Earll said the main objection in keeping the store in its present location is that it will soon outgrow the space provided for it. He stated, however, that M. H. McCollum, manager of the store, would rather keep the present location if he could eventually use the old coke store space.

When asked if there had been any fall in revenue since the movement of the coke store, Earll said that according to McCollum, there seem to be fewer people in the store but when people do come in, it's to buy something.

In regard to moving the store to the Field House, Store board members said this change is in a state of complete indecision. It was said that if the function of the store is purely to supply books and school materials, the location probably wouldn't matter. However, Forum members stated that if the store hoped to continue promoting sundries, etc., it should be closer to the traffic on campus.

As to the third alternative, moving the store into an eventual extension of the Lodge, it was agreed that it would be more convenient to centralize all campus traffic in one area. However, for the present time, it seemed to board members easier and more economical to utilize the old coke store for student store use, rather than to build a new building.

## ATHLETIC COMMITTEE MEETS TO PICK NEW COACH

"We're meeting this afternoon to start screening applicants for the Grizzly basketball coach," Athletic Director Jiggs Dahlberg said yesterday.

Dahlberg added that the faculty athletic committee had met earlier in the quarter, but would go to work in earnest this week in picking a new basketball chief.

"We're waiting for the hiring before a captain for the 1955-56 team is picked," said Dahlberg.

He explained that, although the team ordinarily elects a captain, the new coach may not desire to select a permanent captain.

"Some coaches prefer to appoint a captain for each game," he said.
