### SECOND SESSION OF 23rd LEADERSHIP SCHOOL BEGINS

A total of 31 state and federal employes from 14 states are attending the second session of the 23rd annual School for Administrative Leadership at the University of Montana.

Classes for this session got under way recently and will last until Feb. 23. Course material includes public relations, human relations, national economic policy and public administration, effective writing, economics, community relations, and political interest groups and public policy. Seven UM faculty members are teaching the courses.
