This course is a continuation of Chinese 101. Please refer to last semester's schedule for a statement of course objectives and procedures. Some of the requirements concerning grading and attendance have changed and these are set out below.

**Grading:** There will be seven tests throughout the semester, all of which will count toward your final grade. Short five-minute quizzes on Chinese characters will be held frequently as well. We have a final examination, but no mid-term. Your overall grade will be calculated according to the following percentages:

Tests.....30%  
Quizzes.....20%  
Final exam.....30%  
Class participation.....20%

**Attendance:** You are expected to come to class daily and attendance is taken each day. Four absences will lead to your overall course grade being reduced by one level, e.g. from B to C. The instructor reserves the right to fail anyone with five absences. Two unexcused instances of lateness will be counted as an absence.

**Language laboratory:** As with last semester, two hours of language laboratory work are required each week. A register for signing in and out has been placed at the front desk, and this will be checked weekly. Neglecting this requirement will negatively affect your final grade.
