Writing Assignments

Each student will be assigned one volume for each seminar topic upon which they will prepare a one-page overview for distribution to fellow students and the instructor. The overview should summarize the author's key points. Weekly seminars will consist of brief presentations of their assigned readings and group discussion of themes and contrasting approaches to the subject matter.

Following the seminar, students will submit a five-page critical essay expanding upon the major themes (limited to one or two) addressed in their assigned volume in light of the seminar discussion. Essays are due one week after each seminar.
