

comedy is in the French farcical vaudeville tradition, with songs from French operettas of the mid-19th century. Zany characters are woven throughout the play and jump into a song or dance for almost any reason.

Fadinard, played by Teddy Ulmer, Townsend, UM drama senior, is about to get married when an attractive lady and her irate lover pop up and announce that his horse has compromised her by eating her rare Italian straw hat and that they will not leave the bridal chamber until Fadinard produces an identical one.

He sets off, wedding party at his heels, his prospective father-in-law, by threatening to call the whole thing off, his bride's eccentric relatives constantly getting in the way.

During Fadinard's crazy quest he gets mixed up with an old flame, is mistaken by a baroness for a famous tenor and is forced to sing at her reception.

The Masquer production is directed and choreographed by Les Hankinson, Missoula, graduate student in drama. The set is designed by Glenn Gauer, Great Falls, and costumes by Corliss Nickerson. Nancy Johnson, Conrad, is music director for the production. All are students at the University.

The cast, in addition to Ulmer, includes Ralph Schmidt, Anaconda, as the blustering father-in-law, Nonancourt; George Cowan, Great Falls, as the deaf old uncle, Vezinet; Sharon Strobel, Great Falls, as the bride and Mike Minor, Great Falls, as Cousin Bobin, who would like to stop the wedding.
