## Van Doren Admits Quiz Show Rigged From Start to Finish

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Charles Van Doren, who has admitted taking part in fixed television quiz programs, is being dropped by Columbia University.

Van Doren had offered to resign before making his public confession to house investigators in Washington yesterday. After the hearing, officials of the university in New York City decided to accept the resignation.

On the witness stand, Van Doren changed his previous story and admitted being part of a giant hoax on the viewing public.

The 33-year-old English instructor told house investigators that the now defunct quiz show "21" on which he won \$129,000 was rigged from start to finish.

Van Doren said: "I have deceived my friends and I had millions of them."

He told of receiving questions and answers in advance from the show's producers. He said he was rehearsed in order to increase the program's appeal to millions of viewers.

Once off the witness stand, Van Doren told newsmen—"I feel better than I have in three years." He said he was returning to New York City to sleep . . . something he said he has not been able to do in three weeks.

## UNION SEEKS TO AVOID POSTING \$50,000 BOND

BUTTE (UPI)—The striking International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers seeks to avoid posting a \$50,000 bond which would implement an injunction it has obtained against the Anaconda Company.

The injunction—issued October 20th by District Judge John McClernan of Butte—ordered the company to reinstate hospital contracts covering employees who are mine-mill members. However, the injunction can't become effective until the union posts the bond.

Float decorations followed the theme "Two-Thirds of a Century." Ray T. Rocene, sports editor of the Daily Missoulian and the Missoula Sentinel, was honorary marshal of the parade.

Other dignitaries in the parade included Gov. J. Hugo Aronson of Helena; John L. Delano, president of the Alumni Association; Hugh Kennedy of Missoula and C. H. Rittenour of Plains, members of

## Board of Education OK's Plans for U Construction

The State Board of Education yesterday took the first step toward construction of a new law school building and a large addition to the existing Liberal Arts building at Montana State University in Missoula. The board—meeting in Helena—gave Governor J. Hugo Aronson permission to appoint architects to prepare plans for the structures.

The New Law school would cost \$435,000. The wing to the humanities building would cost \$765,000. MSU President Harry Newburn says location of the Law school building has not been decided.

The Board of Education also moved to ask the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency for funds to finance preliminary plan-

ning of the propose buildings. The Liberal Arts addition would allow the University to bring under one roof most and possibly all non-science departments at MSU and also to eliminate some temporary buildings. The present law building would be converted to other uses, so far undetermined.

**Switch in Fees**  
In other action the Board of Education instructed Dr. Newburn to use student building fees instead of the activity fees to help pay for the MSU swimming pool. The board declared that use of student funds to help pay for the pool would "seriously curtail the general student activity program."

Under a resolution proposed to Central Board, June 5, 1959, not more than one-fourth of the activity fee was pledged for payment of the \$310,000 pool. The pool was constructed in 1957 and 1958 under a bank loan and revenue bond agreement approved March 9th. However, the bank loan was made sometime in 1957 or 1958.

**Seek Federal Loan**  
The Board of Education also authorized presidents of MSU and MSC to seek a three-million dollar Federal loan to finance new dormitories.

Half the three-million dollars would provide for additions to existing men's and women's dormitories on the University campus. The remaining one and a half million dollars would be used for Langford Hall—the MSC Men's dormitory now under construction on the Bozeman campus.

**LA Addition**  
The School of Education would

be housed in most of the Liberal Arts addition with the balance of floor space assigned to the social sciences and humanities sections.

Dr. Newburn said that moving the education department out of the Business Administration building will give the business school space in which to expand.

The move will give the education school "essential space for the next decade or so in close proximity to Liberal Arts with which classrooms can be shared," Dr. Newburn said.

Under Newburn's plan, some of the "temporary" buildings built during World Wars I and II would be razed.

## Expansion at Eastern

In other action, the Board of Education moved toward construction of a two and a half million dollar student union building at Eastern Montana College in Billings. The building would be financed through Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency loans. The loans would be retired with money received from profits from operations of the women's dormitory, bookstore, central food

## Parking Area Behind Library Not Open for Student Parking

Tomorrow University police will start ticketing cars parked behind the library, Tom Monahan, Assistant to the Dean of Students, said yesterday.

"In the past we have been lenient about students parking in this area," said Mr. Monahan, "but the problem has become so bad we have to crack down." The area behind the library is reserved for faculty parking.

About 300 students have been ticketed so far this year for campus violations. Most violations fall into two categories, failure to have a parking sticker on the windshield and illegal parking. If

finances are not paid within 24 hours, they will be doubled.

Mr. Monahan said there are some students who have not registered their cars with the University. He said even though the student may be a Missoula resident, his car has to be registered and have a sticker.

One mistake was noted in the Pamphlet of parking regulations given to each student during registration week. Letter F under registration of vehicles reads, "the permit must be placed on the driver's side of windshield." This of course is wrong. It is a state regulation that stickers can not be placed on the driver's side of the windshield.

## Dr. H. K. Newburn Announces Plans Of Stadium Repair

Repair and renovation of the west stands in Dornblaser Stadium will be undertaken next Spring, it was disclosed by President H. K. Newburn Friday before the joint luncheon meeting of the MSU Alumni Association executive committee and the Endowment Foundation trustees.

Dr. Newburn told the gathering that the last session of the state legislature appropriated \$30,000 for Dornblaser repairs. Engineers indicated that the west stands are most in need of repair, he said, and water leakage would eventually damage the supporting timbers.

Plans call for removal of all west stand seats, replacement of sealing materials on the stadium deck, installation of new seats and repainting. If funds are available, some east stand renovation will also be undertaken, Dr. Newburn said.

Eventual replacement of the stadium is in University plans, he said, and present efforts will be concentrated on maintaining the stands until new ones are built. University authorities are considering relocation of the field. A site east of the Field House has been considered.

The west stands of Dornblaser Stadium were constructed in 1925. The east stands were finished in 1938 and are in better repair.

Individuals and organizations who "use" the "M" and other University property have the obligation to return what they have used to its original condition.

## Still No Reporters at Meetings

The State Board of Education began its first meeting yesterday in Helena since the beginning of the school year. We assume that during the Board's meeting several items concerning the University will be discussed. If the Board continues its established precedent of allowing no reporters to be present during the meetings, we can also assume that the public will have no information concerning the Board's activities save that which the Board wants the public to know.

This is a situation that has existed for some time. There is little indication that the Board will relax its "no admittance" ruling in the future.

A former president of the United States said in a speech that has enjoyed some fame, that the United States has a government of, by and for the people. This is, or should be, true of Montana as well as the rest of the 50 states. Secret meetings of government agencies do not fall into the theory advanced by the gentleman who thought that government should be of, by and for the people. Unless those who support the government by their taxes have every right to be informed of the actions of their government, and all its departments, a truly representative form of government does not exist. We do not feel that the State Board of Education is entitled to hold its meetings without reporters present.

The last legislature defeated a bill that called for open meetings of the Board and other State agencies. Until the next legislature meets, there is little hope that the Board will open its meetings to the public. But, pressure should be brought to bear by the entire University Community and the State on the Board to open the meetings in the future to reporters. Only by open meetings can Montana be assured of accurate reports of the Board's activities.

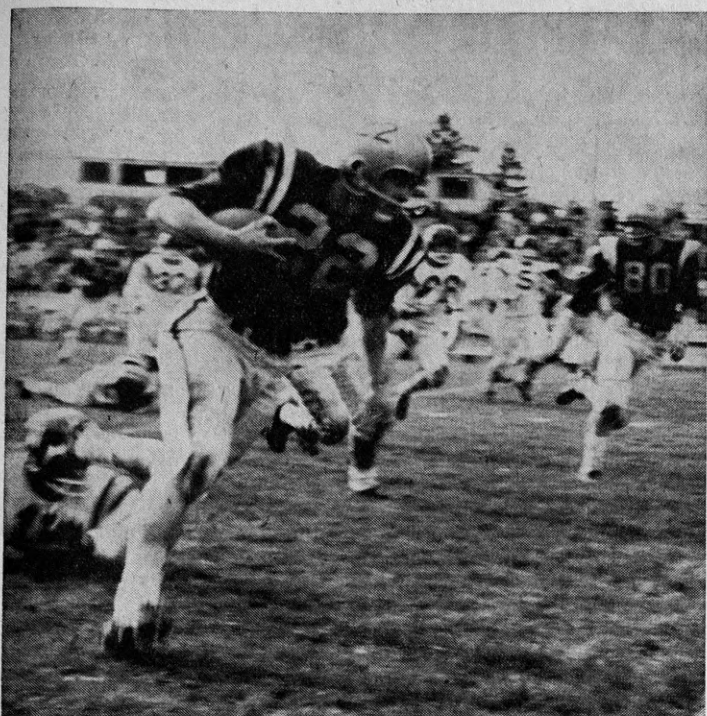

# Platooning Rams Wear Down 'Tips in Last Half; Win 26-16

Depth-heavy Colorado State, held scoreless in a bruising first half, finally wore down an injury-depleted Montana squad in the third quarter Saturday afternoon to take a 26-16 Homecoming victory at Dornblaser Field.

The Grizzlies outplayed the heavier Rams in the first half, combining good passing and running to keep the Rams on the defensive most of the time. Twice the Silvertips moved the ball inside the CSU ten yard line, but neither time could they muster the scoring punch to push it over the double stripe.

The loss of two valuable Grizzlies early in the game might well have cost the Silvertips their second win of the season. After carrying the ball six yards to the CSU four-yard-line in the first quarter, senior halfback Hank Greminger, Montana's leading ground-gainer and best all-around back, left the field with a knee injury. Then, early in the second quarter, another irreplaceable Grizzly was carried from the field, when Bobby O'Billovich suffered a similar ailment.

### Tired Defense

The Grizzly defense, tiring under the relentless ground attacks of two CSU platoons, began to stagger in the second half and the Coloradoans utilized the let-up, scoring twice each in the third and fourth quarters.

The Grizzlies scored for the first time in the third quarter with a two-point safety when Ram safetymen Myron Pearson, after catching a Montana punt, was trapped in the end zone by Grizzly wingman Howie Schwend.

### Lose Two Starters

Despite the loss of two of their starters, the Grizzlies made a game of it in the second half with the deadly aerials of substitute quarterback John Schulz. The skinny

sophomore took the Grizzlies down the field for touchdowns twice in the second half, and nearly did it again the last play of the game, when he tossed a 50-yard missile to sophomore Paul Gustafson. Gustafson was finally nailed on the CSU 20 by the last Ram between him and the goal line.

The Grizzlies' first touchdown came on a ten-yard pass to junior tailback Jerry Dotson, who was yards away from any CSU defender. Dotson ran for the extra points. Schulz had set up his touchdown throw by moving the ball 53 yards on three passes. He fired twice to end John Lands for 19 yards and to Schwend, who made a circus catch of a 34-yard pass.

### Passing Good

Schulz and wingman Jim Harris teamed up to give the Grizzlies their second touchdown in the last quarter. Schulz hit Harris three times for 55 yards, bringing the Grizzlies up to the 12 yard line. Sophomore halfback Gary Ekegren then drove up the middle on a perfectly-executed draw play for the touchdown. The running try for extra points was unsuccessful.

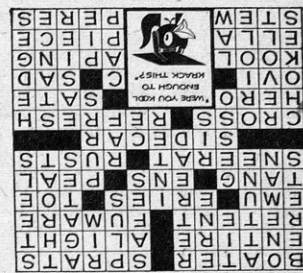
Montana led the Rams in first downs during the contest, getting 19 to CSU's 17, and they outpassed the visitors 238 yards to seven. The Ram ground attack proved to be the game's determining factor, however, as CSU ground out 379 yards to only 122 for Montana.

A duo of Montana tailbacks were the only Grizzlies able to dent the Colorado defense. Dotson and Gustafson crashed for the lion's share of Grizzly ground gain. Both starred on defense in the Grizzlies' sparkling first half defensive effort.

Junior guard Mike Emerson was the best Grizzly lineman in the Homecoming contest, with junior tackle John Gregor also looking good. Three ends, Lands, Harris

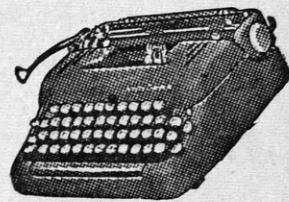
and Schwend were outstanding in the Grizzlies' seventh game of the season.

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## Idaho, MSC Officials Discuss New Western Athletic League

University of Idaho Athletic Director Bob Gibb and Montana State College officials have gotten together in Bozeman for what MSC President R. R. Renne called "a friendly visit."

But the visit, according to several sources, may be the forerunner of initial moves toward forming a conference of eight schools in Idaho, Montana and North and South Dakota.

Renne told United Press International by telephone that he, Gibb and MSC Athletic Director Gene Bourdet were "enjoying nothing more than a friendly visit."

When he was called on his office telephone, Renne said the three were "discussing comparable budgets." He denied that a possible new conference would come up at the meeting.

Gibb, contacted by UPI last Friday, also denied any knowledge of a meeting of any kind or a conference involving Idaho and MSC. He flatly asserted he knew nothing of any discussions and said "they might be between the presidents of the schools."

Announcement of the meeting finally came from Bozeman. Both Idaho and MSC are openly seeking a conference affiliation, but

(Continued from Page One) service and the present student union building. The Board said it hopes to have the building in service by the fall of 1961.

The building also would include a women's dormitory to house 300 co-eds, and would be headquarters for the central food service for the entire campus. The present women's dormitory at EMC would become a men's dormitory.

The board also gave MSC permission to accept a \$198,000 grant from the National Institute of Health and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The money would be used to construct and equip two additional floors of the MSC medical science research building — known as Lewis Hall.

Risse said that regular office hours have been set up for all ASMSU officers, an assistant secretary has been hired, a campus mailing system has been put into operation for smoother campus communications and Homecoming activities were planned far in advance "utilizing all possible sources for a well-rounded program."

Risse also called the meeting with MSC student government officers a step "to better student-government relations and to improve Montanans' opinion of the greater University system."

"Most important," Risse continued, "we have launched a very active public relations program aimed at informing the public of all the desirable ramifications of University life . . ."

Under incomplete projects Risse listed a presentation of the athletic budget to MSU students, unification and possible re-incorporation of the student store and an evaluation of floor space in the Lodge.

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
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
