EFFECTS OF DRUGS
ON NERVOUS SYSTEM
IS SEMINAR TOPIC

MISSOULA--

A lecture-film presentation dealing with effects of drugs on the human nervous system will be presented Wednesday morning at the University of Montana during the seminar for secondary school teachers on the Nature and Effects of Drug Usage.

Dr. Robert L. Van Horne, dean of the UM School of Pharmacy, will discuss "Abused Drugs, Stimulants and Depressants" at 10 a.m. Robert Solomon, health education consultant for the State Board of Health, will present a film at 11 a.m. entitled "Drugs and The Nervous System." Both events will be in the Chemistry-Pharmacy Building (CPB), the lecture in room 102 and the film in room 109.

Demonstration methods of teaching will be presented at 1 p.m. Wednesday in room 109 by two UM faculty members, Norman Jacobson, assistant professor of education, and James W. Cox, assistant professor of chemistry and education.

Workshop groups will meet at 3:15 p.m. in CPB 102, 103, 109 and 202. Rooms 102 and 103 will be available at 7 p.m. for film previewing.

Two discussions, "Drug Control Laws, Their History and Development" and "Education as a Preventive Against Delinquency in Drug Usage," highlighted Tuesday's seminar presentations.

The five-day drug usage seminar is sponsored by a \$3,614.80 grant to the University under Title I (Community Services) of the 1965 Higher Education Act and equivalent funds from the University, according to Thomas J. Collins, director of UM public services.
