A.E.C. REPRESENTATIVE
TO ADDRESS IMPACT MEET

MISSOULA---

M.H. Schwartz, assistant controller for information systems, U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, will be one of the key speakers at the conference on Information Management Potential Analysis Control Systems (IMPACT) next month in Helena.

The conference will be Nov. 14-15 in the House Chambers in the capitol. State agency officials will evaluate the role of automation in state government during the two-day IMPACT meeting.

Sponsored jointly by the Department of Planning and Economic Development and the Bureau of Business and Economic Research at the University of Montana and coordinated by Dr. Patricia Bragg Douglas of UM, the conference includes such topics as characteristics of computer-based information systems, experiences with/statewide data processing program, and the executive, legislative and judicial considerations for information systems.

Gov. Tim Babcock will lead off the government conference with his discussion of "Montana In a Changing Environment." Nationally known speakers include Dudley Solomon, assistant superintendent, Jefferson County School District, Denver, and Carl Vorlander, administrator of financial operations in Wisconsin.
