GALBRAITH SLATED  
TO ARRIVE THURSDAY  
FOR UM LECTURE

MISSOULA---

Dr. John Kenneth Galbraith, an economics professor at Harvard University, is scheduled to arrive at Johnson-Bell Field west of Missoula at 1:15 p.m. Thursday for presentation Thursday night of the second lecture in a series honoring Sen. Mike Mansfield and the University of Montana.

Dr. Galbraith, who served as the nation's ambassador to India during the Kennedy administration, will discuss the "New Industrial State: The Case, Criticism and Consequences" in a public lecture at 8 p.m. Thursday in the Five Valleys Room of the new University Center at UM. There will be no admission fee.

The series, entitled the Mansfield Lectures on International Relations, was established in honor of Senate Majority Leader Mansfield's 25 years of service in Congress and the University's 75th anniversary a year ago. The series is being supported with \$114,000 in funds under the Mike and Maureen Mansfield Endowment within the UM Foundation.

UM President Robert T. Pantzer will be master of ceremonies at the Thursday night lecture.

A discussion session between Dr. Galbraith and economics, history and political science students and faculty is scheduled for 2:30-4 p.m. Thursday in the Gold Oak Room at the University Center. Other meetings on campus slated during Dr. Galbraith's visit include:

Friday--10-11:30 a.m., talk with School of Law faculty and students, Law Building;  
noon-1:30 p.m., faculty-staff luncheon, Montana Room of University Center; 2-3:30 p.m., student question-answer session, University Center Ballroom. Luncheon tickets may be obtained for \$1.75 each at the University Center Information Desk until 5 p.m. Thursday.
