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UM STUDENT FROM ANACONDA
FINALIST IN NYC PROGRAM

John S. Fitzpatrick, Anaconda, a senior majoring in sociology at the University of Montana here, has been chosen as one of 40 finalists for the New York City Urban Fellowship Program.

The program, which is supported by the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation, will involve half of the finalists. Each of the 20 selectees will receive a scholarship valued at \$4,000.

If he wins, Fitzpatrick, who is son of Mr. and Mrs. Marcus L. Fitzpatrick, 2008 Washoe St., Anaconda, will spend one year in New York working under the direct supervision of the heads of New York City governmental agencies.

Fitzpatrick's area of interest is criminology and law enforcement planning as it applies to urban situations.

The student is in New York being interviewed for the fellowship by a committee appointed by Mayor John V. Lindsay. Committee members include Timothy W. Costello, who is deputy mayor and city administrator, and Sigmund G. Ginsburg, assistant city administrator.

Round-trip travel to New York is provided for each of the finalists for the interview. The 20 selectees will receive the return fare to New York. If Fitzpatrick is chosen, \$3,500 of his award will come from the Sloan Foundation and \$500 from UM in matching funds.

Commenting on the selection of Fitzpatrick as a finalist in the program, Dr. Richard A. Solberg, associate dean of the UM College of Arts and Sciences, said, "This is very good evidence of the quality of training provided by our Department of Sociology. The 40 finalists represent an average of less than one per state and there probably were thousands of applications."
