In a rare musical event, the workshop will present a concert of 17th and 18th century French music on Thursday (May 1) at 8:15 p.m. in the UM Recital Hall.

They will perform works by Couperin, Chambonnieres, de Boismortier, Lully, Daquin and Rameau.

Prof. Hut himself will play Acts I-V of Couperin's Les Fastes de la Grande et Ancienne Mxnxstrxndxs. The UM professor, a member of the piano faculty, is the first harpsichord teacher the University has had. The UM is one of only three or four universities in the 50 states to offer instruction in harpsichord, he noted.
