DAVID A. DAINTY WILL TEACH IN TORONTO

MISSOULA --

David A. Dainty, son of Mr. and Mrs. F.G. Dainty, 7 Amberley Drive, <u>Toronto</u> (Scarborough), <u>Ont.</u>, <u>Can.</u>, will assume his new position as teacher of mathematics and physical education at Bathurst Heights Secondary School in Toronto during the academic year 1969-70.

During this summer Dainty has instructed a new youth recreation program on the University of Montana campus. The program began June 23 and will continue through Aug. 22.

The program, for boys and girls 8-12 years old, attracted nine youngsters. They included children of faculty, students and the general public.

The program, termed "successful" by Dainty, includes activities as gymnastics, soccer, volleyball, badminton, swimming, punch ball and push ball.

Dainty conceived the program with Dale L. Stagg, a UM graduate assistant from <u>Salt</u>

<u>Lake City</u>, <u>Utah</u>, and Gordon S. (Don) Morris, who was a graduate assistant at UM last spring.

Stagg will continue the program the remainder of the summer.

Dainty expects to receive his master's degree in physical education at UM in spring of 1970 following the completion of his thesis on anaerobic capacity, or the ability to perform without oxygen.

Dainty plans to enter Pennsylvania State University, Park, Penn., in the academic year 1970-71 to work on his doctorate. Dainty received his bachelor's degree from the University of Toronto, Toronto, in 1968.
