Aubrey Logan, an outstanding guard from Chicago, has announced his intention to enroll at the University of Montana on a basketball scholarship this fall.

The 6-2 standout tallied 23 points per game for Austin High School, and also pulled down 16 rebounds per tilt last season. The two-year All-City selection graduated in the upper one-third of his class.

UM Assistant Coach Lou Rocheleau, making the announcement, said Logan chose Montana over some 30 other major college offers he received.

His high school coach, Jim Burgeson, told the UM coaching staff that Logan "can play for any major college in the country."

"That's how good a prospect he is," Rocheleau said. "We're looking forward to working with him for the next four years."
