UM FOREST BUSINESS
STUDENT RECEIVES
\$500 SCHOLARSHIP

MISSOULA--

A senior student in the University of Montana School of Forestry has been named recipient of a \$500 scholarship for the 1969-70 academic year by the Soil Conservation Society of America (SCSA).

Fred C. Martin Jr. of Glendale, Calif., was one of 19 junior and senior students in higher education receiving the awards, which were presented during the 24th annual SCSA meeting at Fort Collins, Colo., for need and scholastic proficiency.

The 19 recipients were selected from among 279 award applicants.

Martin, who is son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred C. Martin Sr., 312 E. Dryden--No. 7, Glendale, was graduated from Herbert Hoover High School, Glendale, in June 1965.

The younger Martin, who was active in Boy Scouts, has been a speaker at junior high schools in Montana for the UM Forestry Club. During recent summers he has been an employe of the U.S. Forest Service and in private industry.

Following graduation the younger Martin plans to do graduate work in international management and foreign development.
