MONTANA LITTLE SMYPHONY
TO PERFORM NOV. 16
AT UNIVERSITY

MISSOULA--

The Montana Little Symphony, the 32-piece orchestra of the University of Montana, will give its first concert of the season on Sunday (Nov. 16) in the Music Recital Hall.

The 8:15 p.m. performance is open to the public without charge. Smyphony conductor is Eugene Andrie, UM professor of music.

Featured performers will be new UM music staff members Esther L. England, mezzo-soprano and visiting instructor in voice and music, and Jerry L. Domer, oboist and assistant professor of music.

Miss England, who received her bachelor's degree at UM in 1967, was engaged in operatic rôles in Europe for the past two years. She will perform in two duets by Mozart with Janet Kenney, Missoula, a UM music junior. While in Europe, Miss England studied voice in Munich, Germany, on a Fulbright graduate scholarship.

Domer will be joined by music staff members Florence Reynolds, cellist; Edwin Rosenkranz, bassoonist, and Andrie, violinist. Domer, who earned a bachelor's degree from UM in 1960 and a master's degree from Boston University in 1962, is currently principal oboist with Amici della Musica Orchestra, Santa Clara, Calif.

Frank Diliberto, lecturer in music, will appear for the first time with the group. He will conduct the Aaron Copland Outdoor Overture and the Haydn Symphony Concertante. Diliberto organized and directs the Jazz workshop at the University.

Andrie will conduct the balance of the program which will include the Beethoven Symphony No. 4 in B flat major.

The symphonic group is modeled after the classic orchestra of Mozart and Beethoven, and features music from Baroque to 20th century styles performed to highlight its wind soloists and string choir.
