UM STUDENT SPEAKS  
IN LIVINGSTON MARCH 5

MISSOULA--

Grant W. Roset of Anaconda, a junior at the University of Montana, will address the Livingston Junior Women's Club Thursday (March 5) at the group's March meeting.

Roset will speak at 8 p.m. at the Park Electric Co-op Building, 306 S. 12th, Livingston, as a representative of the University's Student Ambassador Program, a program launched in 1967 to acquaint high school students with college life. The program has since been expanded to include talks before adult groups as well as high school students.

Concerning Thursday's program, Roset said, "Since there are so many positive activities on the Missoula campus that the general public is unaware of, the Livingston program will give me an excellent opportunity to tell our side of the story."

The program in Livingston will be the 23rd presentation around the state since last October.

Towns visited by the Ambassadors have ranged from Glendive and Terry to Plains and other communities.

The Student Ambassador Program is cosponsored by the UM Associated Students and the UM Alumni Association.

During the recent Christmas vacation, 88 UM students visited 51 high schools around the state in an effort to interest high school students in going to college.

"The program has become a very effective sounding board for the students at the University to help make the people of Montana aware of the activities of the Missoula school," said Fred W. Traber, Great Falls, chairman of the Ambassador program.
