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"FUN-DO" OFFERED AT UM AGAIN SPRING QUARTER

Specialized classes called "Fun Do" will be offered spring quarter at the University of Montana for students, faculty, staff and their spouses.

The "Fun-Do" courses will be held in the University Center(UC) once a week from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. beginning April 6. The cost per course is \$10.

Interested people should register in the UC office or call UM publications coordinator and graphic artist, Patti A. Hirst. Her office is in UC room 109 and her office phone number is 243-4674.

Mrs. Hirst, coordinator of "Fun-Do", said, "Spring quarter's classes offer a wide variety of artistic expression."

"The great interest shown in the past points to a promising spring session," she added.

Beginning April 6, cake decorating will be taught by Russell Sites, baker for the UC Food Service. Emphasis will be on uses of decorating tubes in the icing of cakes, petits fours, hors d'hoeuvres, and cookies.

Silkscreening will be taught again this quarter by J. Milton Beens, director of Art Services at UM, beginning April 6. Silkscreening, an old oriental printing process, utilizes stencils on stretched silk. The class will be of special interest to people who want to make their own posters, greeting cards, and stationery. Beens is currently doing graduate work at UM and hopes to teach art on the college level.

Mrs. Alexine Rice, graduate assistant at UM, will teach batik, which is a cloth dyeing process using a wax resistance technique, starting April 6. Mrs. Rice has participated in one-man and three group shows in Oregon. "FUN-DO" OFFERED AT UM--2

Lee Nye, free-lance photographer from Missoula, will teach beginning and seminar photography starting April 7 and 9, respectively. The beginning class will deal with the fundamentals of lighting, development, printing and enlargement. Corrective techniques and special effects will be stressed in the more advanced seminar class.

Metal sculpturing will be taught by John Vichorek, teaching assistant in art at UM, beginning April 8. There will be instruction in the techniques of welding, fabrication of metal sculpture and the usage of various tools. Vichorek, who has participated in several Wisconsin art shows, will also conduct discussions on art as a medium of personal expression.

Beginning April 8, Charles Hertler, professor of health and physical education at UM, will teach the fundamentals of fly tying. Emphasis will be on the tying of dry flies, wet flies, streamer flies, nymphs and bugs.

A course in two- and three-dimensional painting will be taught by Richard Mammel, a candidate for a Master of Fine Arts degree at UM. Students will be encouraged to work with oils, acrylics, woods, metals, fabrics and plastics.

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
