Registration for this quarter's "Fun-Do" classes is still open to University of Montana students, faculty, staff and their spouses.

The specialized courses will be held in the University Center (UC) once a week from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. beginning April 6. The cost per course is \$10.

"This quarter's classes offer a wide variety of artistic expression," said Patti A. Hirst, coordinator of the "Fun-Do" program.

Cake decorating as an art will be taught by Russell Sites, baker for the UC Food Service.

J. Milton Beens, director of Art Services at UM, will again teach silkscreening, an old oriental printing process.

Beginning and seminar photography will be taught by Lee Nye, a free-lance photographer from Missoula.

Batik, a cloth dyeing process, will be taught by Mrs. Alexine Rice, a graduate assistant at UM.

Charles Hertler, professor of health and physical education at UM, will instruct a class in fundamentals of fly tying.

A course in two- and three-dimensional painting will be taught by Richard Mammel, a candidate for a master's degree at UM.
