LAW SEMINAR SCHEDULED  
FRIDAY FOR UM INDIAN MEET

MISSOULA--

Law faculty from the University of Montana, the University of California at Los Angeles and the University of New Mexico will participate in the Indian Law Seminar Friday at UM during the second annual Kyi-Yo Indian Conference on the Missoula campus.

The law program, the fifth seminar scheduled during the Indian conference on education, will be held from 1-4 p.m. Friday in room 101 of the UM Law School Building. Title of the seminar is "Civil Disobedience As A Tactic to Improve Indian Legal and Economic Status."

Lorraine Edmo, Pocatello, Idaho, Indian conference publicity chairman, said the law seminar participants will include John McCabe, assistant dean of the UM School of Law; Fred Hart, director of the Indian Law School at the University of New Mexico; Monroe Price, UCLA law professor.

Also, Kahtineta Horn, Caughnawaga, Quebec, Can.; Bud Mason, a student at Black Hills Teachers College, Spearfish, S.D., and Victor Charlo, Evaro.

Four other seminars dealing with Indian progress and problems in education will continue Friday from 9-10:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.-noon in various campus buildings.

The seminars are entitled "Education: Opportunities and Services," "Indian Student Involvement on Campus," "Indian History and Indian Power" and "Educational Progress: American/Canadian."

One of the featured speakers during the seminar entitled "Education: Opportunities and Services" will be Alonzo Spang, who is provost or on-site president of Navaho Community College, Many Farms, Ariz.

Spang, who this fall will become the first director of the University of Montana Indian Studies Program, will present his views on Indian education during the seminar.

Keynote speaker Saturday, the final day of the three-day Indian Youth Conference, will be Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., who is slated to address conference participants and the general public at 9 a.m. in the Harry Adams Field House. There will be no admission charge. The Kennedy address had been scheduled for 8:30 a.m.

Kennedy is scheduled to leave Missoula by noon Saturday.
