Cynthia Hough, a University of Montana graduate music major, will present her graduate piano recital at 8:15 p.m. Wednesday (April 22) in the UM Music Recital Hall.

Miss Hough, who is daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Hough, 8325 Eaton Way, Arvada, Colo., received her bachelor's degree last June from Adams State College, Alamosa, Colo. She is a graduate of Westminster High School, Westminster, Colo.

Selections to be presented by Miss Hough at Wednesday's recital include "Sonata, Opus 90" by Ludwig van Beethoven, "Quintet in E flat major, K. 452" by Wolfgang Mozart, three works by Erik Satie and "Sonata, Opus 7" by Edvard Grieg.

Accompanying Miss Hough during various portions of Wednesday's program will be Linda Vogel, oboe; John Hancock, horn; Ken Kirkpatrick, clarinet, and Klif Hodgkin, bassoon.

Miss Hough, who is a native of Denver, Colo., said she plans to teach piano after she receives her master's degree. Her teacher at the University of Montana is Rudolph Wendt, a UM music professor.
