TO ADDRESS LIONS MEMBERS

MISSOULA--

Garry E. Pitts of Dixon, a sophomore at the University of Montana, will visit with members of several Lions Clubs next week in Ravalli.

Vice-chairman of the UM Student Ambassador Program, Pitts, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene L. Pitts of Dixon, will address members of the Dixon, Ronan, Plains and St. Ignatius Lions Clubs Tuesday at 6:30 p.m. at the Bison Cafe, Ravalli.

Pitts, who was graduated from Dixon High School in 1968, said the purpose of his visit is "to provide an information service to Lions Club members and other adults in the Dixon vicinity."

He said this will be the 29th trip of the UM Student Ambassadors to a civic group since the ambassador program began in 1967. The main function of the overall program is to provide information about UM for parents as well as high school students.

"The program for adults next week in Ravalli," Pitts said, "will include a presentation of the various problems and issues confronting the students at the University in Missoula today."

Pitts said he will be willing to discuss any potential problems about the campus, including voting age and the general problems faced by freshmen enrolling on the Missoula campus for the first time.

"My discussion," Pitts said, "will depend to a great degree on the questions asked by the audience."

He said he hopes the program leads "to a greater appreciation of the human elements involved in university life in general."
