UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA TO HOST
MONTANA BROADCASTERS RADIO SCHOOL

MISSOULA----

Thirty persons have enrolled in a comprehensive six-week course leading to an examination for the F.C.C. First Class Radio-Telephone Operator's License July 6-August 14 at the University of Montana in Missoula.

The no academic credit course is sponsored by the Montana Broadcasters Association and the Elkins Institute of Dallas, Texas. The course instructor will be Dave Clemens of the Elkins Institute.

The First Class License legally qualifies the holder as an engineer at all AM, FM, or TV broadcast stations; at police broadcast stations; at aircraft communications stations, and all other stations using voice communications for commercial purposes.

A one week 60-hour optional course for those interested in radio-TV announcing, board work and production will follow the first class license school. The workshop will utilize the radio and TV lab facilities at UM and the FM station (KUFM) to give students actual on-the-air experience. Twelve students are enrolled for the course which will be taught by Philip J. Hess, director of the UM Radio-TV department.

An F.C.C. examiner will be on campus to give the First Class License Examination August 7.
