NOTED ENVIRONMENTALIST  
SPEAKS AT UM

MISSOULA--

The ecology movement in the United States is part of a "multistranded movement of change" in this nation, Dr. Luther P. Gerlach, noted environmentalist and social anthropologist, told a large audience at the University of Montana Aug. 4.

Dr. Gerlach said the United States, as the most revolutionary country of all, has been the agent of social change throughout the world for the past 25 years.

"By going into underdeveloped countries and modernizing them with our medical aid and other technology, we have upset their social and economic systems and caused social tension," he said.

"Relatively speaking, for the amount of social change in the U.S., there is very little stress," Dr. Gerlach said.

In his lecture, the "Politics of Environment," he stated that the ecology movement employs more fundamental change than any other movement.

Dr. Gerlach is an associate professor of anthropology at the University of Minnesota. His lecture was sponsored by Summer Session.
