SPOKANE CRAFTSMAN
TO HOLD ART EXHIBIT

MISSOULA--

The works of Harold Balazs, an artist from Spokane, Wash., will be exhibited at the University of Montana from Sept. 24-Oct. 25.

The display will be open to the public from 1-5 p.m. in the University Center Gallery on the Missoula campus.

Balazs previously worked in collaboration with architects on public buildings, creating such works as interior relief panels, carved doors and cast brass fixtures to fit the needs of architectural design.

A number of his works may be seen at Geiger Field, the main Spokane airport. Balazs is working on sculptural designs with Eugene, Ore., Architects Morin and Longwood for use in the First Methodist Church of Eugene.

Balazs, 42, a native of Westlake, Ohio, was graduated with a bachelor's degree in fine arts from Washington State University, Pullman, in 1951.

In 1966 he was awarded a medal for craftsmanship from the American Institute of Architects.

Balazs has tentatively scheduled a public lecture on the arts, which will conclude his exhibit on Oct. 25.
