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Course Organization

Upon arrangement with the individual students, the course meets twice weekly for 50 minutes. The location of the classes will vary. They may be held in Room 204 or in Mansfield Library. Specific instructions will be given in the preceding class. A primary purpose of the course is for the student to seek out and read research reports in his/her major field of study and interest.

In addition, the course includes the following concentrations: a. exploring research questions and their statements of purpose b. formulating research proposals c. becoming familiar with qualitative and quantitative research methodologies as well as different types of research such as historical and ethnographic research d. reading and interpreting research e. becoming familiar with the different scholarly writing styles f. creating a bibliography and stating it in APA style g. becoming acquainted with the resources available through the various data bases Readings: a. The student must identify and gain access to at least three professional journals in his/her major field of study and interest. b. The instructor will be distributing readings on different aspects of research methodology. Other readings may be placed on Reserve at Mansfield Library.
