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## AS 102.01: Introduction to Asian Studies

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#### INTRODUCTION TO ASIAN STUDIES

This course is designed for students with little or no previous study of, or experience with, Asia and is intended to be an introduction to Asia for those who might be thinking of pursuing Asian Studies in more depth. At the same time it is suitable as a 'stand-alone' course, either for those interested in broadening their education through gaining some understanding of non-western societies and traditions, or for those with an Asian Studies Emphasis who wish to expand their knowledge of Asia beyond their area of specialization. It could also be of interest to Asian students who are curious about other Asian cultures and about the way the West looks at and studies Asia.

### Content & Structure

- AS 102 focuses on a range of cultural areas, including South, South-East, Central and East Asia.
- It is intended as an <u>introduction</u> rather than a <u>survey</u>, and is composed of a broad culturalgeographical introduction followed by (three) modules that provide a series of 'samplers' that examine specific themes, issues and traditions. The approach is multi-disciplinary and, as well as being set in historical context, each module focuses on a core 'text', for example a novel or a film.
- The chronological emphasis is on the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.
- AS 102 is part of a two-course sequence, AS 101/102, designed to provide an opportunity for a broad introduction to Asian Studies. AS 101 is offered in the autumn, AS 102 in the spring semester. The two courses share the same structure but have different modules; also the emphases in the cultural-geographical introduction differ. It is possible to take either course singly as a 'stand-alone'.

#### **Themes**

A number of themes are given particular emphasis throughout the course:

- The Individual and Society.
- Cultural traditions that shaped and continue to shape Asian identity.
- The Impact of the West. (Some understanding of this theme is necessary for any grasp of contemporary Asia.)

#### Readings, Lectures, Films

- Course materials include novels and films by Asian writers and film makers, as well as a number of documentary videos.
- Rhoads Murphey's textbook, A History of Asia, provides historical and cultural contexts, and integrates the course.
- Two feature films are scheduled for evening viewing: on Apr 12th and May 3rd (both Thursdays). Attendance is required.
