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### Law for laymen and air pollution are subjects of evening courses

LAW FOR LAYMEN AND AIR POLLUTION  
ARE SUBJECTS OF EVENING COURSES

Courses that will inform laymen about matters that affect their everyday lives are among winter-quarter evening extension offerings at the University of Montana.

"Practical Law Survey," a two-credit course taught by Bruce Barrett, J.D., a faculty affiliate of the UM home economics department, will view such areas of law as landlord-tenant relations; basic criminal law, including search and seizure; domestic law, including divorce, adoption and custody; negligence and automobile accidents; and the court system.

The class will meet from 7 to 10 p.m. in Liberal Arts 336 for seven Tuesdays, starting Jan. 13.

"Weather--How It Affects Air Pollution" is a three-credit course on air-pollution meteorology with emphasis on how the amount and distribution of pollutants are affected by atmospheric conditions such as winds, precipitation, sunshine, temperature and moisture, particularly in western Montana. The instructor is Aaron Zimmerman, a faculty affiliate of the UM geography department.

The class will meet on Tuesdays, starting Jan. 13, from 7 to 10 p.m. in Liberal Arts 234.
