### Course Topics

This class examines the development and power of the modern Presidency. This includes the process for selecting Presidents, the historical development of the Presidency, the President's relationship with the public, the media, and Congress, and the President's role in budget and foreign policy.

### Course Texts

There is one central textbook: *Presidential Leadership* by Edwards and Wayne, 7<sup>th</sup> edition. In addition, there are articles listed in the syllabus and news items I will distribute as opportunity arises. I will distribute both the articles and news stories by e-mail.

### Course Grading

Grades are based on class participation (20%), one midterm (20%), a research paper (30%), and a cumulative final (30%). Papers are due at the beginning of class. Late papers will be penalized a full grade for each day late.

### Course Rituals

Every class we will begin by discussing recent Presidential news. You are strongly encouraged to follow political events using some combination of local newspapers, news websites, and cable TV news. You are expected to read the readings before coming to class. If this obligation is neglected, I may ask students to summarize readings for the class.
