UM DEPARTMENT OF ANTHROPOLOGY OFFERS
SUMMER SESSION COURSES

MISSOULA--

Summer session offerings of the University of Montana Department of Anthropology include "The Archaeology of Montana" and "Indians of Montana," to be given during the first four-week session, June 22-July 17.

UM Professor Dee Taylor will teach "The Archaeology of Montana," a class designed especially for persons who are not majoring in archaeology or anthropology but are interested in the prehistoric inhabitants of Montana and adjoining areas.

The course will trace the development of human cultures in Montana from the earliest evidence of human presence (10,000 B.C.) to the time of white contact. The class will provide information on the major periods of prehistoric cultural levels, the types of sites found such as buffalo jumps, tipi rings, occupation sites, pictograph panels, battle pits and other subjects. Short field trips with voluntary participation are planned to nearby archaeological sites.

UM Professor Carling Malouf will teach "Indians of Montana," a class designed for teachers of all levels, as well as the general public, who have interests in Native Americans in Montana and its adjoining areas.

Malouf has been studying Indian tribes in Idaho, Wyoming, North and South Dakota, Alberta and British Columbia since 1960. His publications are extensive and he is frequently asked to testify in state and federal courts as an expert witness on Indian culture and history.

UM OFFERS SUMMER ANTHROPOLOGY COURSES

The first half of the course will be concerned with historic matters, such as the appearance and disappearance of tribes in Montana. The second part of the course deals with social life, family structures, material culture, economics, political structures, religion and arts. A field trip to the Fourth of July celebration and dances at the nearby Salish and Kootenai Reservation is planned.
