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NATIVE AMERICAN STUDENTS AT UM RECEIVE \$13,000 GRANT

MISSOULA--

Students in the Native American Studies Program at the University of Montana have received a one-year \$13,000 National Endowment for the Humanities Youthgrant, a special category grant made available to people under 25.

According to Joanne Swaney, St. Ignatius, a sophomore in Native American studies at UM and grant project director, the students involved in the project have chosen to make a videotape program depicting Native American college students in a university setting. The project is titled "Native American College Students: Living a Bicultural Lifestyle."

Swaney said the project is designed to draw attention to the "uniqueness of Native American culture, traditions, values and the problems and virtues of minority students in a university environment."

The UM radio-television department is in charge of videotaping for the project, which began with taping the 13th annual Kyi-Yo Pow Wow May 1 and 2. Taping for the project will be conducted at UM, the Missoula area and on the Flathead Indian Reservation.

The first public showing of the completed project will be during the 14th annual Kyi-Yo Conference in May 1982 at UM.

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
