The learning goal of this lecture course is student understanding of the major structural and legal features of American government. These characteristics, as covered in the lectures and listed on the review sheets, provide the basis of the examinations. The three examinations will use objective (not essay) questions. The dates of the first two examinations are Feb. 23 and Apr.5. The first two examinations will count 66 points each. The final examination, which is scheduled for May 10, 10:10 a.m., will count 68 points. Thus, a total of 200 points can be earned in the course. The course grades will be determined as follows: A-top 15%; B-next 20%; C-next 30%; D-next 20%; F-bottom 15%. For the P/NP grading option, only an A, B, or C determined by the just-described grading curve will count as a "pass." Make-ups for the first two examinations must be prearranged and taken within two class days of the scheduled time. Weekly review/discussion sessions will be conducted by the Teaching Assistant.
