C.	<b>Reflection Essay,</b> you are to write a three-page essay discussing your reflections about ASLA as a method/approach for language instruction, what you felt was learned, and your thoughts on its utility for revitalizing Native languages.	Worth 20 pts
D.	<b>Final Assessment,</b> consists of verbally translating 40 phrases from English to Arapaho (1 point each) and 40 phrases from Arapaho to English (1/2 point each), 10 write phrases in Arapaho (1 point each) & translate to English (1 point each)	Worth 80 pts
	Graduate students will be responsible for writing a final research paper that discusses theories on language acquisition and methods for Native language revitalization. Additionally you are to assess your perception of how ASLA fits within these theories and Methods with regard to the effectiveness of the methods you are comparing ASLA The final paper needs to be between 1,800- 2,000 words with a minimum of 5 reference citations, from five different sources, with a properly formatted bibliography page.
