UM CELLIST TO PERFORM

MISSOULA--

Fern Glass Boyd, assistant professor of music at the University of Montana, will present a free recital on Tuesday, Oct. 26, at 8 p.m. in the Music Recital Hall.

She will be accompanied by UM faculty pianists Steven Hesla and Margaret Evans.

Glass Boyd is principal cellist with the Missoula Symphony Orchestra and also performs with the Montana Baroque Ensemble and Montana String Quartet. She received her bachelor of music degree from the Eastman School of Music and a master of music degree from Yale University. She has twice been a fellowship recipient to the Aspen Music Festival and last year she was one of four winners from the Northwest selected to perform in the Janos Starker Master Class in Walla Walla, Wash.

The program will consist of Suite No. 1 in G Major for Unaccompanied Cello by J.S. Bach; Chant du Ménestrel, op. 71 by Alexander Glazunov; Kol Nidrei, op. 47 by Max Bruch; and Sonata in A Major, op. 69 by Beethoven.
