SCHOLARSHIPS ANNOUNCED FOR GRADUATE STUDY IN SCOTLAND

Scholarships of up to \$10,000 for a year of graduate study at any university in Scotland are offered to American students of Scottish descent by the Saint Andrew's Society of the State of New York.

The society's scholarship program promotes cultural exchange between Scotland and the United States.

The awards are made on a competitive basis to men and women nominated by their institutions on the basis of academic achievement, participation in other activities, responsible leadership, financial need and employment, evidence of Scottish descent, and a statement of personal objectives.

Only one applicant will be considered from any college or university. This applicant must be recommended by the president of the institution or his or her designated representative.

Interested students should get in touch with Richard A. Solberg, UM associate academic vice president, by Nov. 30.
