There will be three examinations and each test will use objective questions. The dates of the first two examinations will be Sept.29 and Nov.3. The final examination will cover material from the second examination to the end of the course and is scheduled for Monday, Dec. 15, at 8:00 a.m.. The first two examinations will count 66 points each and the final will count 68 points. Thus, a total of 200 points can be earned in the course. The course grades will be determined as follows: A-top 20%; B-next 30%; C-next 30%; D-bottom 20%. Failing grades will be determined at the instructor's discretion and as exceptions to the above distribution. Make-ups for the first two examinations must be taken within four days of the scheduled time. Weekly review/discussion sessions will be conducted by the TA on Wednesdays at 5:00 p.m. Nov. 11 is a holiday. Thanksgiving vacation is Nov. 26-28.
