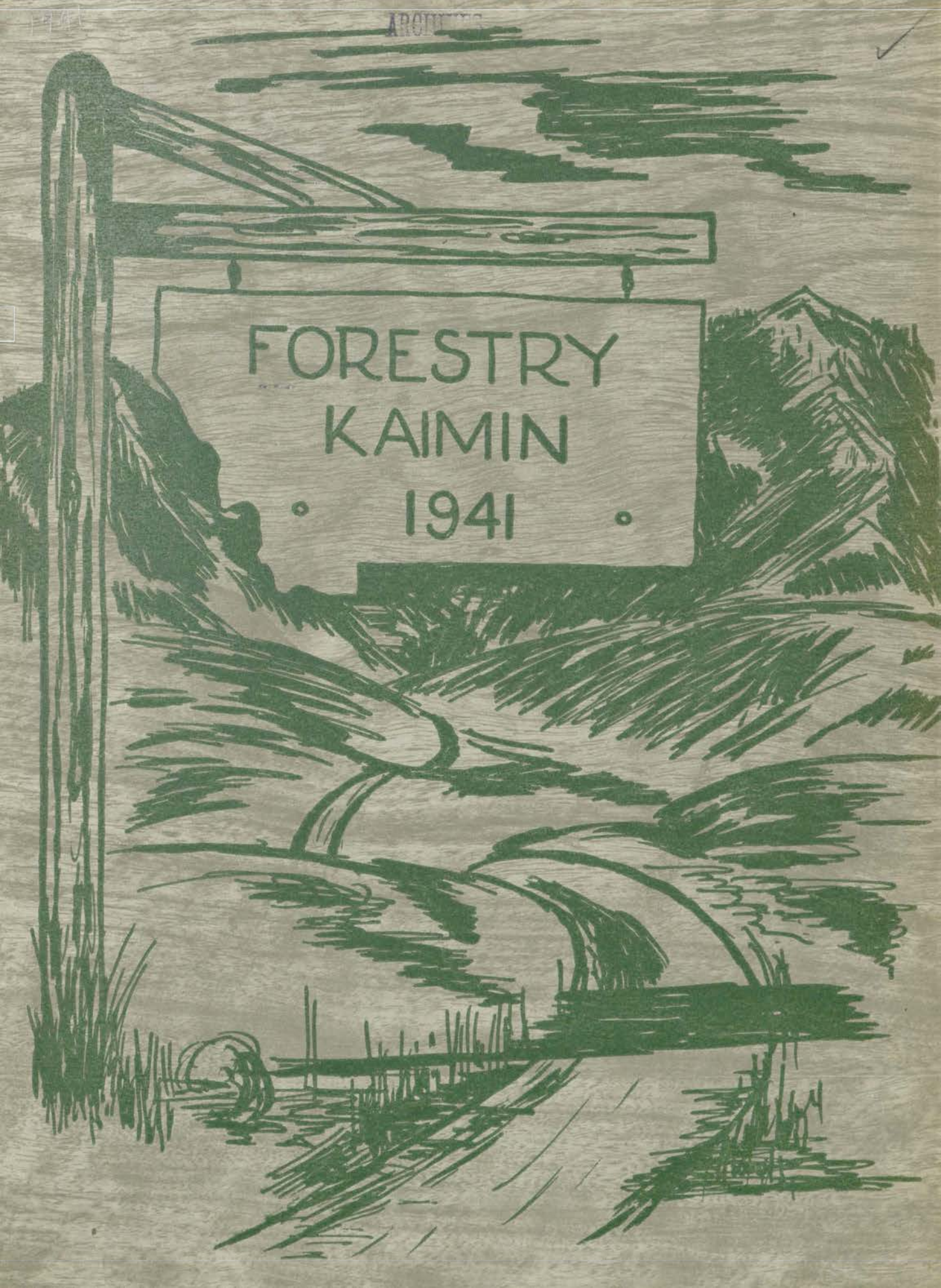

## *Foreword*

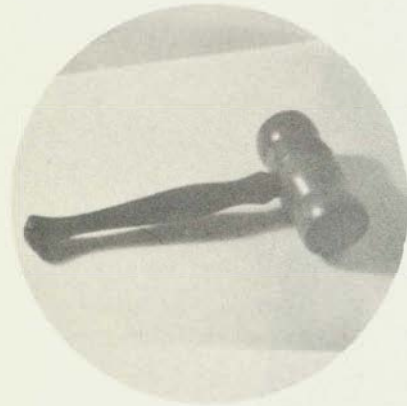

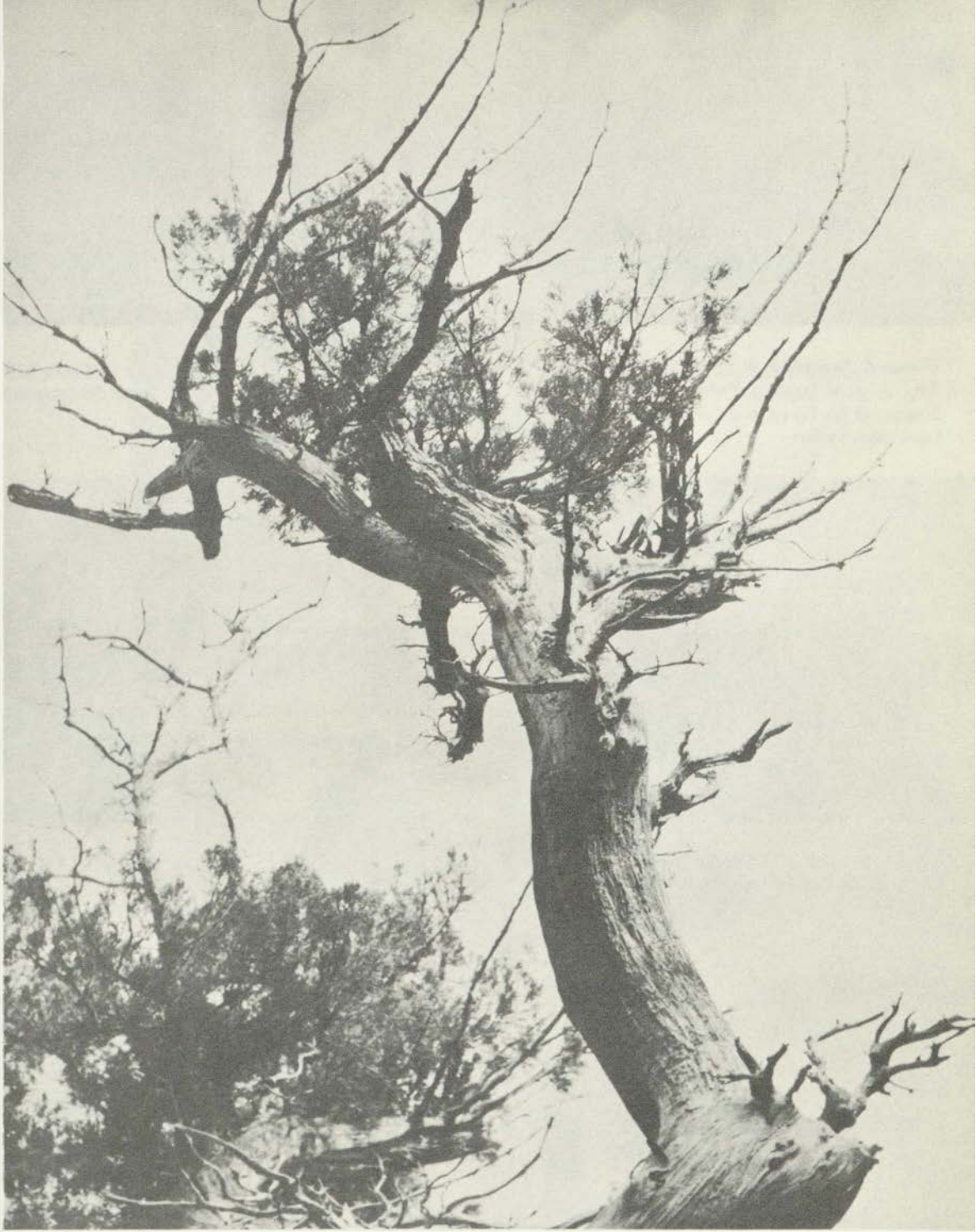


PROFESSOR CHARLES W. BLOOM

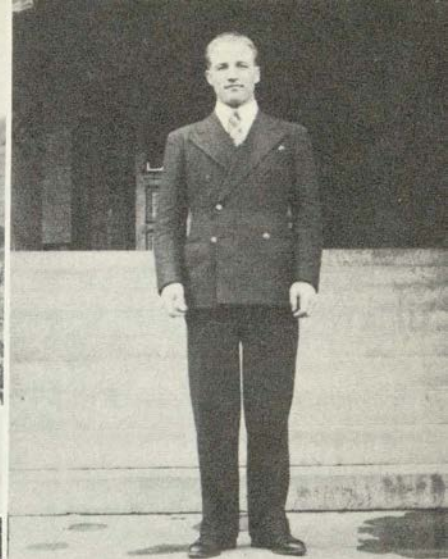

# Forestry Club heart of the school



Every other Wednesday

"FORESTRY" is a small name for one of the largest of professional fields. It may be interpreted as ranging from managing the Hereford and the Rambouillet to growing the Douglas fir and the oaks. It requires a personnel highly trained for the technicalities of the job and one that can operate in a smooth, efficient manner. The Forestry School gives an opportunity to learn this technical knowledge while the Forestry Club offers the opportunity for the member to develop the characteristics necessary to put that knowledge to work.

Regional Forester Evan W. Kelley said in a recent speech that the following were the most common

reasons for failure of the graduate to be suited for work in the Forest Service: (1) They do not fit into the environment and therefore cannot make their way. (2) They are so individualistic that they cannot function as a component part of an organization. (3) They are by nature introverts—shy, shunning company—lone wolves. (4) They are egotistical—big-heads. (5) They are the high-brows—hold themselves socially superior. (6) They lack essential qualities of leadership.

It can be seen these reasons are not only a hindrance to success in forestry but in any other field. The Forestry Club endeavors to rectify such reasons, particularly the last five, for the failure of the graduate in the profession. Every member is encouraged to participate in discussion at the meetings, serve on committees and take part in the many club activities. Those characteristics that are desirable are brought out in the individual and developed while those adverse tendencies are quelled. Cooperation is emphasized. "Big-heads" and "high-brows" learn early that their kind is not tolerated. The organization of man power necessary to put on the club hikes, dances, parties, smokers and Forester's Ball calls for a display of leadership and offers a chance for development of this trait.

It is hard to describe concretely those qualities that give "oomph" to the aptitudes of the fellow that goes places in forestry but surely those qualities derived from a combination of a good forestry school and an active forestry club are essential.

# A. W. F. C.

At its third annual conclave at Logan, Utah, this year, the Association of Western Forestry Clubs appeared to have matured from just another mildly interesting event to an established tradition.

The idea originated here at Montana about four years ago, developed into a first conclave represented by ten western forestry clubs in 1939. The original purpose was to exchange ideas for betterment of the clubs, and this more than fulfilled all hopes, but the representatives went even further in formulating plans and generating enthusiasm for what might be accomplished. The idea of similar sectional associations for the central, eastern and southern schools was developed, the purpose of gaining student or junior membership in the S. A. F. originated, and a constitution for this purpose was presented to the society.

Last year at Corvallis, Oregon, the organization started serious thinking on those original plans, considered what would be needed for stability and permanent life, wobbled somewhat on its young legs but took several forward steps.

Our 1941 conclave at Utah State College proved itself by drawing these abstract ideas down into concrete working plans.

Henry Clepper, executive secretary of the S. A. F., spent two days with us, discussed the society's proposed constitution for our affiliation, and discussed the attitude and lack of interest of some of the eastern schools toward forming similar associations. He pointed out the probable reason for this as being a lack of knowledge and understanding of our program. He expressed the society's interest in our organization and the hope that through a program of publicity and education, we might interest schools in the other sections in organizing.

The conclave unanimously accepted the society's constitution with two minor amendments.

A resolution was passed that copies of our publication be sent to every forestry school, and that the publication be improved by articles that would interest other non-member schools.

A resolution for publicity was also put into effect with Utah State as director of a year-long publicity campaign to be carried on by all member clubs to acquaint other schools with our ideas and purpose.

The Iowa delegates agreed to organize a mid-

west association next year and to hold a conclave at Ames, Iowa.

Of course, there was the usual formal and informal exchange of ideas between clubs. Outstanding among ideas brought back to our school was that of the summer fire camp initiated at Oregon last year. Out of that idea our own school, in cooperation with the forest service, has completed plans for a similar camp that will furnish training, experience and employment for all our underclassmen.

Frank Bailey, Jack Schaffer, Walt Schaffner, and Charles Thielen represented the club. Thanks to the Dean for allowing us the use of the school pickup, we drove down on half the allotted money—always welcome news in club affairs.

The Utah boys showed us a royal time in addition to doing a splendid job of conducting the conclave. They took us to Paul's Party, dated us with the best queens of the campus, entertained us at a banquet and steak feed, and in between times provided plenty of excitement by "fuedin" with the engineers.

To sum things up, A. W. F. C. is definitely on its feet, but needs everyone's help to keep going. You fellows in school: keep in touch with member clubs, read and write for the "Affairs," and keep the publicity campaign rolling throughout the year. You alums and others away from school: tell people what the A. W. F. C. is and what it wants to do. If you feel inspired write an article for the "Affairs" or send in suggestions or criticisms—they'll be appreciated. You can help too by acquainting other society members with our existence and our desire for affiliation with the S. A. F.

If you will give this help, A. W. F. C.'s idea will spread to all sections of the country from this western nucleus and the S. A. F. will be able to admit a junior membership with every confidence in its stability and value.

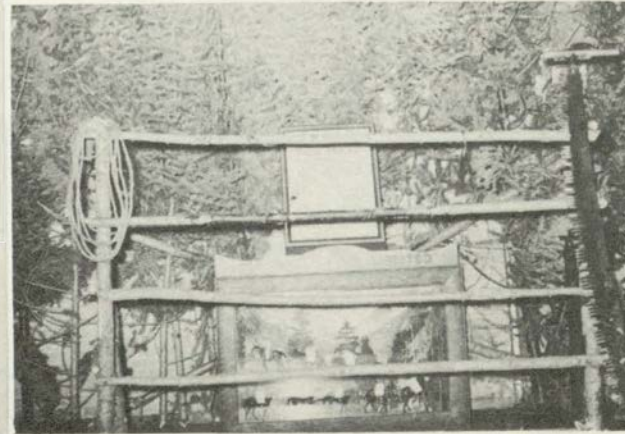

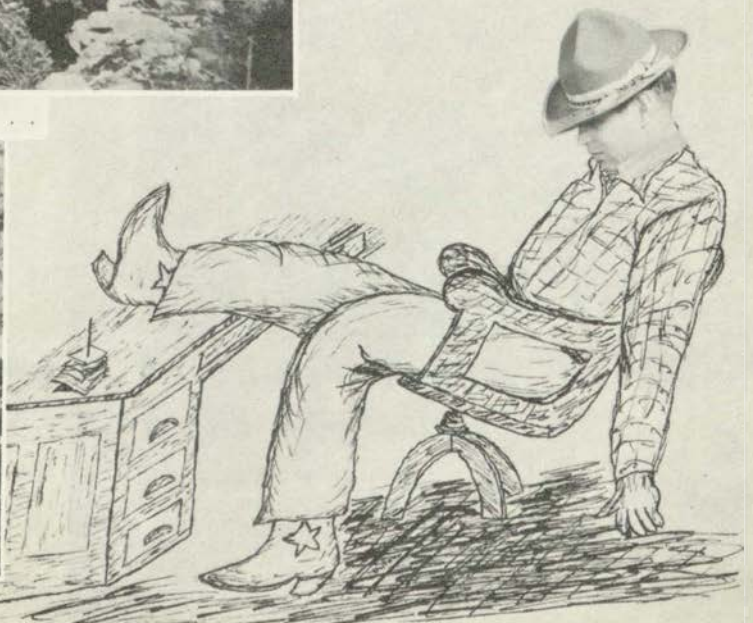
