[SIDE A]

- 000-070 Someone is introducing a group of people who are sitting at the front table.
- 071-150 The president of the society is introduced and he begins speaking in Japanese. [Translation] he is saying what a great honor it is to have MJM come and speak. He again speaks in Japanese.
- 151-200 [Translation] he is giving a brief background of MJM's career. He also comments on the importance of the US-Japanese relationship. He again speaks in Japanese.
- 201-250 [Translation] he is commenting on how fortunate that Japan is to have such a person as MJM in Tokyo. He then presents MJM.
- 251-300 MJM makes a few introductory comments.
- 301-350 MJM comments on the importance of the Japan-US relationship.
- 351-400 MJM says that the US and Japan must resolve their differences in a quiet and orderly manner. MJM is impressed with the calm level exchange that he has witnessed since his arrival in Tokyo in June. He cites examples of the professional manner with which disagreements are resolved between the US and Japan.
- 401-450 MJM says that there is much less disagreement now between the US and Japan than there has been in the past.
- 451-500 MJM talks about friendship and its application to the US-Japanese relationship.
- 501-550 MJM notes that people must realize that everyone must cooperate in today's world to get along.
- 551-600 MJM comments on his career as a legislator and how important it is for people to understand other people.
- 601-650 MJM comments that Japan, since WWII, has kept their faith in the US, even through the Vietnam War.
- 651-700 MJM continues to comment on the importance of getting along and agreeing with each other.
- 701-750 MJM says that we must continue to work with other countries in the world although we value the bilateral

relationship between the US and Japan very highly. MJM cites an example of agreement between companies in the US and Japan.

751-800 MJM comments on the importance of the nuclear industry to Japan. MJM says that the danger of having people get weapons grade plutonium has got to be reduced.

801-850 MJM comments that a study on the continued operation of nuclear plants, whose fuel has been depleted, was completed in early June. MJM says that negotiations between the US and Japan in this area have been going on and the conclusion is that Japan could use a facility for recycling the depleted nuclear fuel.

851-900 MJM says that concessions on this subject have been made on both sides.

901-940 MJM feels that the success in these talks will serve as aids to future conflicts that Japan and the US might have.

[SIDE B]

000-050 MJM comments that since the first day in office, President Carter has recognized the importance of the US-Japanese relationship.

051-108 MJM says that the US must approach the world by "tap a light". MJM explains that miners said this in relation to dynamite sticks, if you tap them too hard they may explode. MJM comments that there are potentially explosive issues in the world today, so the US must be careful. MJM concludes his speech. Someone is speaking in Japanese.
