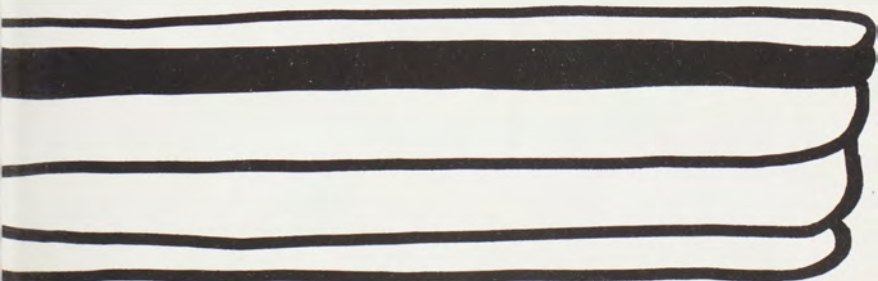

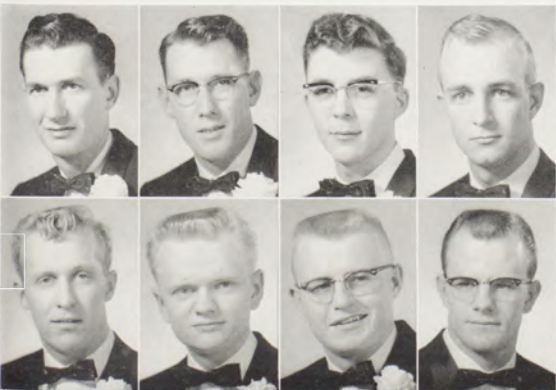


ALPHA TAU OMEGA

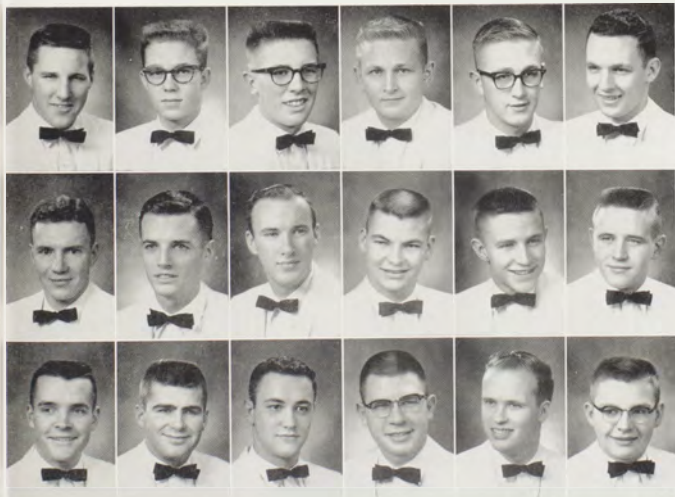

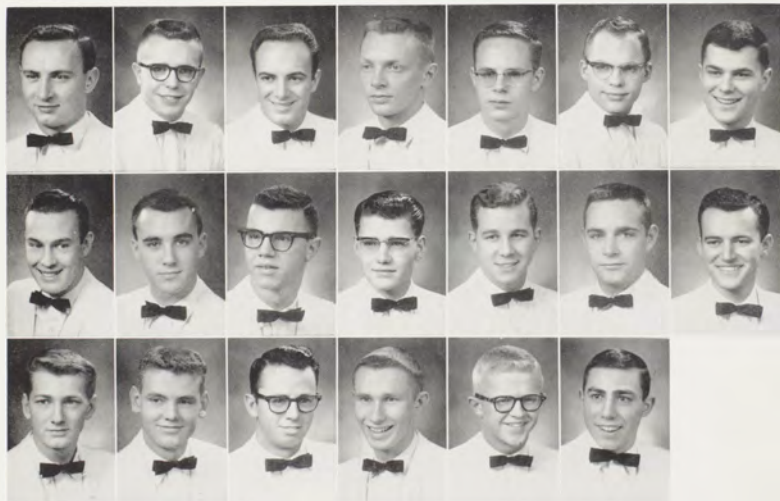

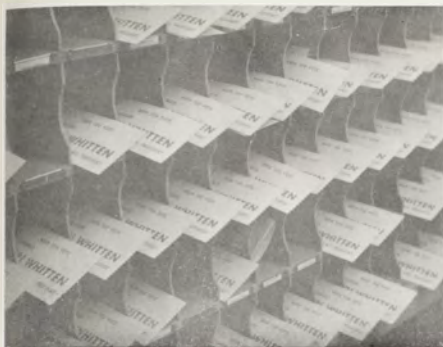
