COURSE DESCRIPTION

ANTY 227 Human Sexuality 3 cr. cross-listed BIOL focuses on biological, behavioral, and cross-cultural aspects of human sexuality to help students place their own sexuality and that of others in a broader perspective. Topics include: sexual research, theory, history, anatomy, physiology, development, reproduction, diseases, identity, current affairs, and expression.

Educational Methods: Lectures, PowerPoint presentations, group and panel discussions, inter- and intrapersonal activities, individual research, demonstrations, guest lectures, online networking and fieldwork.

Course Goal: Study and practice how to learn about human sexuality

Course Objectives: As a result of this course, students will be able to

- ☐ critique sexuality education systems;
- ☐ summarize the story of sexology including its origin, progress, obstacles, and current position;
- ☐ recognize historical figures, researchers, and celebrities who have influenced sexuality;
- ☐ identify parts and functions of internal and external reproductive anatomy;
- ☐ compare sexual response phases of three theoretical models;
- ☐ evaluate a sexual problem using a three-dimensional model;
- ☐ find the current general treatment principles of sexual problems;
- ☐ describe the process of and challenges to conception;
- ☐ assess contraceptive methods and select a strategy to implement;
- ☐ negotiate intimate relationships;
- ☐ conduct a risk assessment of sexually transmitted infections;
- ☐ differentiate between paraphilias and paraphilic disorders;
- ☐ enhance sexual performance;
- ☐ converse with people of differing sexual identities, expressions, and beliefs;
- ☐ research graduate programs, professional organizations, and associations in sexology;
- ☐ ask questions about sexuality;
- ☐ distinguish between legal and illegal sexual acts;
- ☐ name at least six professions in the field of sexology

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Grades are earned and calculated from three tests and fieldwork (the value one exam). A final exam determines whether or not you receive a grade. If you do not take the final exam you will receive an Incomplete until you do so. **You will need a scantron to take the exams including the final exam.** Each test is 25% of your overall grade. The fieldwork is worth 25% of your overall grade. Final grades for the course depend on an overall cumulative score and attendance at the mandatory final exam: 100%-89.5% = A, 89%-79.5% = B, 79%-69.5% = C, 69%-59.5% = D, 59%-0% = F. No +/- scores will be given. Students who do not attend the final exam will receive an Incomplete.

Rescheduled tests and exam policy:

Sickness, family emergency, participation in The University of Montana athletic competitions, or conflicts with other course exams are legitimate reasons to miss lecture or to request rescheduling an exam. Except in case of emergency, students missing exams must reschedule them in advance. Students rescheduling exams must document their absence with appropriate documentation. Opportunities for fieldwork will be presented throughout the semester. To receive 100% you must complete at least 100 credit points. Each category of fieldwork is worth a different point value. Points are earned by completing the fieldwork and the records forms which you'll find available in class and on Moodle. If you turn in your field paperwork by before November 7, 2012 at 2:10 PM you will receive an additional 5 points.
