Course Description:

Anthropology 330 is a course about current issues in the four regions of contemporary sub-Saharan Africa—Southern, East, Central, and West Africa. This course is structured to explore current issues from a cultural perspective that draws upon local history, analyses of forms of social organization, and an examination of traditional and ‘modern’ political modes and structures. Students will learn about key issues from the perspectives of African guest speakers, non-African anthropologists and social scientists who specialize in Africa, journalists, and medical providers from the non-African developing world. African food, art, and music will be discussed as well as more serious subjects such as the Rwandan genocide, the plight of long term refugees and the HIV/AIDs outlook for the region.
